Call to Order – Vice Chair Ron Buckholtz called the meeting to order at 9:02 am. Roll Call taken. Quorum was met.

Certification of Compliance with the open meeting law was met.

Meeting Agenda

Public Comment – Public comment was heard.

Minutes from Previous Meeting – A motion was made by Mr. Buckholtz to approve the minutes of the February 4, 2021, meeting; second by Dale Schleeter. Motion carried without negative vote.

Circuit Court Report – Mr. Hoff updated the Committee on the remodeling status, indicating that the Resolution to fund the construction was passed at the February County Board meeting. The County is now working with Venture contractors to finalize design and submit an RFP to choose the construction manager of the project. The courtroom facility will house other functions of the county staff in addition to courtroom services.

Clerk of Court Report – A written report was provided.

District Attorney's Office Report

Child Support Department Report – A written report was provided; no questions asked of Ms. Ocomoto.

Coroner's report -- A written report was provided. Mr. Onarheim reported that a meeting date of March 23rd is scheduled between the coroner's staff and Health & Human Services to discuss the issue of addressing hazardous living conditions within the community. A motion was made by Mr. Buckholtz to postpone the discussion of hazardous living conditions to the April Public Safety meeting; second by Mr. Schleeter. Motion carried without negative vote.

Emergency Management Department Reports – A written report was provided. Ms. Sanchez advised the committee that their focus has been on providing appropriate PPE supplies to the county and in offering Covid-19 tests at the Winter Fire Hall. The reimbursement funds for providing such services has been received from the State office.

Criminal Justice Coordinating Council Update – A Memorandum of Understanding between Lac Courte Oreille tribe and Sawyer County to identify contributions for services available to county citizens in the criminal justice system was presented for discussion. The MOU is a renewal of a previous understanding providing representation from the tribe in

addition to a \$50,000/year financial contribution for the next three years to help offset criminal justice service costs. The MOU recognizes the partnership. A motion was made by Mr. Schleeter; second by Mr. Peters to accept the MOU at this Committee level and advance it to the County Board for consideration and possible adoption. Motion carried without negative vote. A second document to amend the MOU was presented for the purpose of recognizing the sitting tribal court judge as a member of the Criminal Justice Coordinating Committee (CJCC). A motion was made by Mr. Van Etten; second by Mr. Buckholtz, to approve this amendment. Motion carried without negative vote.

Ambulance Service Department report – A written report was provided. Mr. Dunston advised that the ambulance service is now seeking only one full-time position to be filled. Mr. Dunston has been getting contacted by the Ashland community to seek information on our services, as much of their area is without an ambulance provider. No formal request has been made to our County representatives. The new paging program is now in service and working well.

Sheriff's Department Report – Written reports were provided and reviewed for the Communications Center, Patrol services, Jail services and radio communications. The Joint Power Agreements approved at last meeting are now out for signature and the 911 system is working well. Patrol reports indicate a decrease in call volume from the previous month and from the previous year. Mr. Sajdera reported that the transition in working with JusticePoint staff is going smoothly and the jail is considering opening on-sight visitation soon. A written report from Ms. Shelton regarding animal control calls was provided.

For the purpose of discussing the 2021 Cooperative Law Enforcement Agreement between Sawyer County Sheriff's Office and the Lac Courte Oreilles Band of Lake Superior Chippewa Indians, a motion was made by Mr. Buckholtz; second by Mr. Peters to convene to closed session at 9:48 am. Roll Call vote was taken: "Aye" votes include Mr. Schlender, Mr. Buckholtz, Mr. Peters, Mr. Schleeter, Mr. Van Etten. No "nay" votes. Motion carried without negative vote. A motion was made by Mr. Buckholtz; second by Mr. Schleeter to adjourn closed session at 10:04 am. A voice vote was taken and motion carried without negative vote.

In open session, Ms. Tonn presented the Law Enforcement agreement for consideration. Chief DeBrot explained that the agreement enables Sawyer County deputies to write citations into the tribal court, forwarding required information that may result in a tribal court citation. Mr. Van Etten made the motion to accept the amendments as written and to move the Agreement forward to the County Board for consideration and possible adoption; second by Mr. Schleeter. Motion carried without negative vote.

Meeting Date/Time – The next meeting of the Public Safety Committee will be Thursday, April 8, at 9:00 am in the Assembly Room.

1 **Resolution in Support of Increased County Child Support Funding**

3 **RESOLUTION NO. _____**

6 **WHEREAS:** SAWYER County Child Support Agency administers the Child Support
7 Enforcement Program on behalf of the state, providing services to approximately 1200 families
8 in Sawyer County residents including paternity establishment, obtaining child support and health
9 insurance orders for children, and enforcing and modifying those orders; and
10

11 **WHEREAS:** Our children's well-being, economic security and success in life are
12 enhanced by parents who provide financial and emotional support; and
13

14 **WHEREAS:** County child support agencies collected \$935 Million in child support
15 during 2019 and established 98,405 health insurance orders for Wisconsin children; and
16

17 **WHEREAS:** Sawyer County's Child Support Agency provides services to children as
18 well as custodial and non-custodial parents that reduce childhood poverty rates, establish
19 parental rights and promote the involvement of both parents in the lives of their children; and
20

21 **WHEREAS:** The economic security and social service programs provided by Sawyer
22 County Child Support Agency are needed by Wisconsin children and families now more than
23 ever due to the economic downturn caused by COVID-19; and
24

25 **WHEREAS:** State funding for county child support services has failed to keep up with
26 county agency costs, which have steadily increased due to growing caseloads, inflation and new
27 federal regulations; and
28

29 **WHEREAS:** Wisconsin's Child Support Enforcement Program has fallen from 2nd in
30 the nation for collecting current support to 5th; and
31

32 **WHEREAS:** Wisconsin's decreased performance has led to the state losing out on an
33 estimated \$70,000 in potential federal incentive payments between Calendar Year 2019 and
34 2020; and
35

36 **WHEREAS:** An abrupt federal interpretation change in June 2019 eliminated \$4.2
37 million in federal birth cost recovery matching funds for Wisconsin; and
38

39 **WHEREAS:** Wisconsin's strong performance in child support is at risk without
40 additional state funding. Further drops in performance would result in additional reductions to
41 federal funding for Wisconsin; and
42

43 **WHEREAS:** Decreased federal funding results in less funding for Sawyer County's
44 child support agency. This could lead to reductions in child support enforcement staff and
45 services and reduced child support collections; and
46

47 **WHEREAS:** New state investments in child support are amplified by a generous federal
48 match. Every \$1 of state GPR invested in the Child Support Program generates roughly \$2 in
49 federal matching funds; and

50
51 **WHEREAS:** Wisconsin's Child Support Enforcement Program is incredibly cost-
52 effective, collecting an average of \$6.20 in support for every dollar invested in the program.

53

55 **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Sawyer County Board of
56 Supervisors respectfully requests that state funding for county child support agencies be
57 increased by \$4 million GPR in each fiscal year of the 2021-23 Wisconsin state budget, which
58 will generate approximately \$7.7 million in additional federal funding each year. This investment
59 will ensure that Wisconsin counties can continue to effectively provide economic support to our
60 children.

62 **IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED** that a copy of this resolution be forwarded by the
63 County Clerk to the Governor of the State of Wisconsin, State Senators and State
64 Representatives representing Sawyer County, the Secretary of the Wisconsin Department of
65 Administration, and the Wisconsin Counties Association for consideration.

68 and was recommended for approval by the Sawyer County Board of Supervisors at its meeting
69 on April 20, 2021.

Patrol Report- Attached.

- Patrol calls volume had an upward tracking for the past 3 months, Jan '21 was 879, Feb '21 with 719, while Mar '21 is 792. A slight decrease of 20 calls from Mar '20, which was 812. Note* That due to the timely reporting required to the Clerk, the monthly totals will only reflect initially from the start of the month through March 30th, but following months will begin to reflect total numbers from report date to report date rather than for each completed month.
- We are pleased to announce that one of our full-time jail staff, Carter Hartling, who started Patrol Field Training on Jan 1st, 2021, has successfully completed his 10-week training track and has been released for solo patrol duty status. As already full time in a night jailer position, his primary responsibility will continue to be in that status, but will be used to fill vacant shifts when able and to perform other essential staffing functions.
- We recently held a County Wide School Safety initiative and recently had an online meeting with the various school officials from Hayward, Birchwood, and Winter Districts. LCO and Northern Lights were unable to attend at the time, but we have them continually included in future meetings. Topics discussed were LEO responses to school threats, bus complaint issues and ALICE training.
- We have also been contacted by the new Emergency Preparedness Coordinator at Hayward Hospital and will be participating in a lockdown exercise as well as coordinating with their staff on future trainings.

Sawyer County Communications System Specialist – Apr 2021 PS Committee Report

- 1.) **Dispatch Audio/Console Audio** – The new system has a different audio response as compared to audio through the WISCOM System. In addition, we have found that the audio levels set on the system previously were never set upon installation. In doing testing last week it appears that audio alignment is going to need to take place. However, this is not a general cure all for everything.

It is important to remember that with this new system that user operation is very important. Talking too close to the microphone or talking too far away from the microphone on both the users and dispatch side all impact the audio quality and ability. In a digital voice system, the lows and the highs are processed differently as compared to a mid-range frequency response. The audio range is approximately 300 Hz – 3000 Hz for audio processing of normal audio for the human ear. The higher tones have an easier means of response, but the lower tones tend to drop sharply sometimes. In this case we use a 1000 Hz tone to adjust and set audio levels.

The 1000 Hz tone can be generated from the console out on to the system and levels are then set in that manner. The incoming audio levels are sent in a similar fashion with a tone generated over the air of 1000 Hz and the audio levels are then set. The rest of the proper audio is going to come down to proper operation of the radio.

- 2.) **Microwave/AirLinks** – In a measure to save cost as well as increase reliability a plan to use microwave links (also sometimes called AirLinks via manufacturer) is being planned. The feed would be able to keep all the sites intact and communicating with one another on its own backhaul system. Using a system like this will reduce monthly costs as well as allow us to control our own backhaul for the system. Planning into a system like this does take a little bit of time to confirm data pathways as well as ensuring that it is reliable. We are currently working on this to be able to link six towers.
- 3.) **Planning for Subscriber Unit Replacement** – Starting in the next fiscal year I would suggest looking at starting to replace radios and if possible, start at the end of this year if possible. The current radios being used in the squads (EF Johnson 5300) and the majority of portables (EF Johnson 5100) were announced End Of Life (EOL) in Oct. 2016. Repairs are still possible but with each repair the concern of cost effectiveness does come into play. While radios are being replaced time will soon start to become a factor. On an average a radio issue is being discovered or fixed every three weeks. Some repairs are simple ones that can be done by cleaning or on-site/field correction. Other radios are not able to be repaired and extras maybe needed soon.
- 4.) **Additional work** – As stated above radio repairs for squad radios are being done.

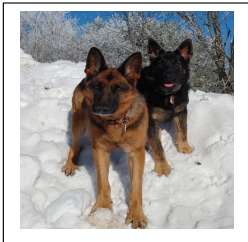

Part I Section C. 2. Public Safety/Court Systems

Mission / Purpose: Provide leadership for Sawyer County by coordinating with the Public Safety and Justice Departments for the County, which provide for the safety of the citizens and guests of Sawyer County; monitoring outcomes, reviewing, and recommending to the County Board policies related to the public safety initiatives of the County.

Membership: The Public Safety Committee shall be comprised of five (5) County Board Supervisors appointed by the Chair of the Sawyer County Board of Supervisors at the April meeting of the full county board in even numbered years.

Term: Members shall serve for a two-year term concurrent with their terms of office as County Board Supervisors.

Officers: The committee will elect amongst itself a chair to conduct meetings consistent with published agendas and a vice-chair to assist in the absence of a chair.

Reporting Relationship: The Public Safety Committee shall be accountable to the County Board.

Committees of Jurisdiction: The Public Safety Committee shall serve as the County liaison and have the primary responsibility of conferring with and providing guidance, including review of policies and developing budgets, to the following County departments:

- Sheriff
- Ambulance
- Coroner
- Emergency Services
- Clerk of Courts
- District Attorney
- Circuit Court
- Child Support

The duties and responsibilities of the Public Safety Committee include but are not limited to:

1. Identify the need for and recommend to the County Board policies related to the public safety of the County.
2. Review programs and associated budget requirements prior to their being considered for inclusion in the County budget.
3. Facilitate broad based discussion of issues and policies encouraging public involvement and communications with the public.
4. Serve as the initial contact point for individuals and/or organizations who wish to introduce or review County Board policy regarding County public safety.
5. Delegate operational procedures and practices to appropriate administrative committees and departments of the County.
6. Initiate a study to determine future criminal justice issues.
7. Fulfill all statutory requirements assigned by the County Board.
