Call to Order – Chair James Schlender called the meeting to order at 12:00 pm.

Certification of Compliance with the open meeting law was met. Roll Call was taken. Quorum was met.

Meeting Agenda

Public Comments

Minutes from previous meeting – A motion was made by Mr. Helwig; second by Mr. Johnson to accept the minutes of the May 5, 2021, meeting as presented. Motion carried without negative vote.

Criminal Justice Coordinator update – Ms. Fisher advised that JusticePoint is now supervising 118 pre-trial individuals (contracted for 50) and have one individual in the diversion referral system, another pending, and one individual on alcohol monitor. Due to being over-capacity they are beginning to send memos to the court advising that they cannot supervise until capacity reduces. It was recommended that a discussion between the TGB and the County be re-introduced to find solutions to the over-capacity issue and secure assistance in staffing/supervision roles.

Ms. Leichert reported that they are reviewing a different assessment tool so they can reach more people since this PSA tool does not require an in-person interview. A motion was made by Mr. Shuman; second by Mr. Helwig to allow use of the PSA risk assessment tool and get access through the Sheriff's Department for staff to complete background checks. Motion carried without negative vote.

Ms. Leichert advised that due to busy schedules, the Ad Hoc work group will discontinue bi-weekly meetings and instead will meet on an as-needed basis. Work on the TAD grant continues.

Community Services Updates – Mr. Hilgendorf reported that many individuals are inquiring about staying at the Greater Hayward House of Hope, however, few are willing to complete the program that is required for admittance. One resident in the home is doing very well. The entity has now built four sheds and is beginning to build signs for area businesses as a means to help fund the facility. There is room for two more residents.

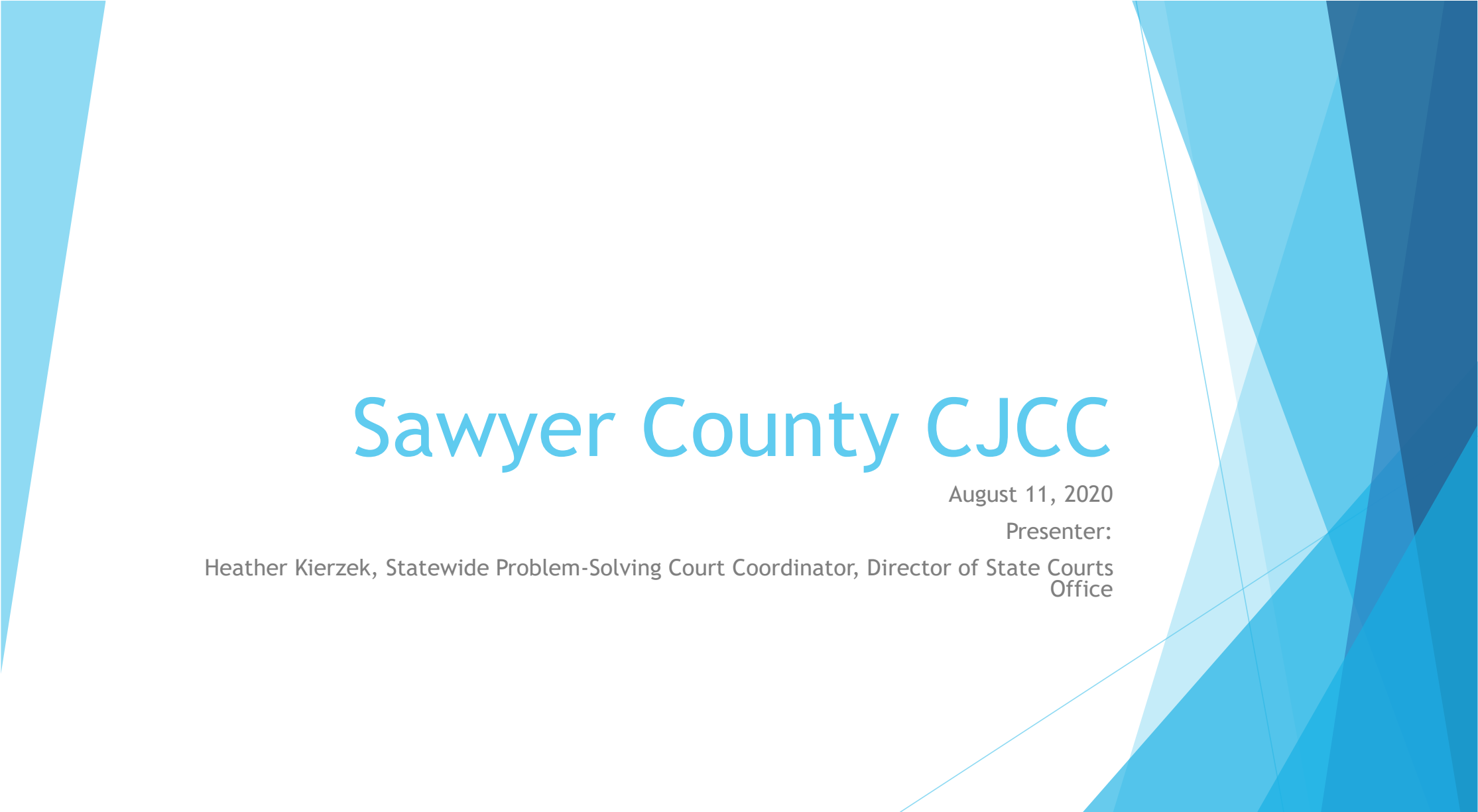
Mr. Hilgendorf reported that the Reflections Women's Housing has three residents currently in the program; some others who have started but failed to perform the requirements and could no longer remain in the housing unit. There is no time limit on the duration of stay, and there is room for three more individuals at this time.

Lieutenant Johnson provided a list of out-sourced education and assistance programs that are offered to jail inmates.

Treatment Alternatives and Diversion (TAD) Program Overview

TAD Program Overview - WI Statute 165.95

- ▶ Alternatives to incarceration grant program
- ▶ Funding for counties and tribes
- ▶ Fund treatment courts and diversion programs
- ▶ Criminal involvement related to drug or alcohol use
- ▶ Goal of TAD-funded programs:
 - ▶ Improve public safety
 - ▶ Reduce prison and jail populations
 - ▶ Reduce prosecution and incarceration rates/costs
 - ▶ Reduce recidivism
 - ▶ Improve the participants' lives and their families

TAD Statute 165.95 Cont.

- ▶ Serves adults (age 17+)
- ▶ Competitive funding round every 5 years
- ▶ Oversight committee required to receive funding (CJCC)
- ▶ Data collected by DOJ - CORE Reporting System
- ▶ Risk/Needs assessments & full clinical assessments
- ▶ Services consistent with Evidence-Based Practices
- ▶ Graduated incentives and sanctions

TAD Statute: Violent Offender Restrictions

- ▶ In this section, “violent offender” means a person to whom one of the following applies:
 - ▶ The person has been charged with or convicted of an offense in a pending case and, during the course of the offense, the person carried, possessed, or used a dangerous weapon, the person used force against another person, or a person died or suffered serious bodily harm.
 - ▶ The person has one or more prior convictions for a felony involving the use or attempted use of force against another person with the intent to cause death or serious bodily harm.

TAD Statute: Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT)

- ▶ Cannot prohibit participants from using MAT
- ▶ Program allows participant to use MAT if:
 - ▶ Examined by a licensed healthcare provider and determined MAT to be most appropriate form of AODA treatment
 - ▶ Medication prescribed by authorized medical professional
 - ▶ Person is taking the medication as prescribed for a diagnosed substance use disorder

Treatment Alternatives and Diversion (TAD) Program Sites**

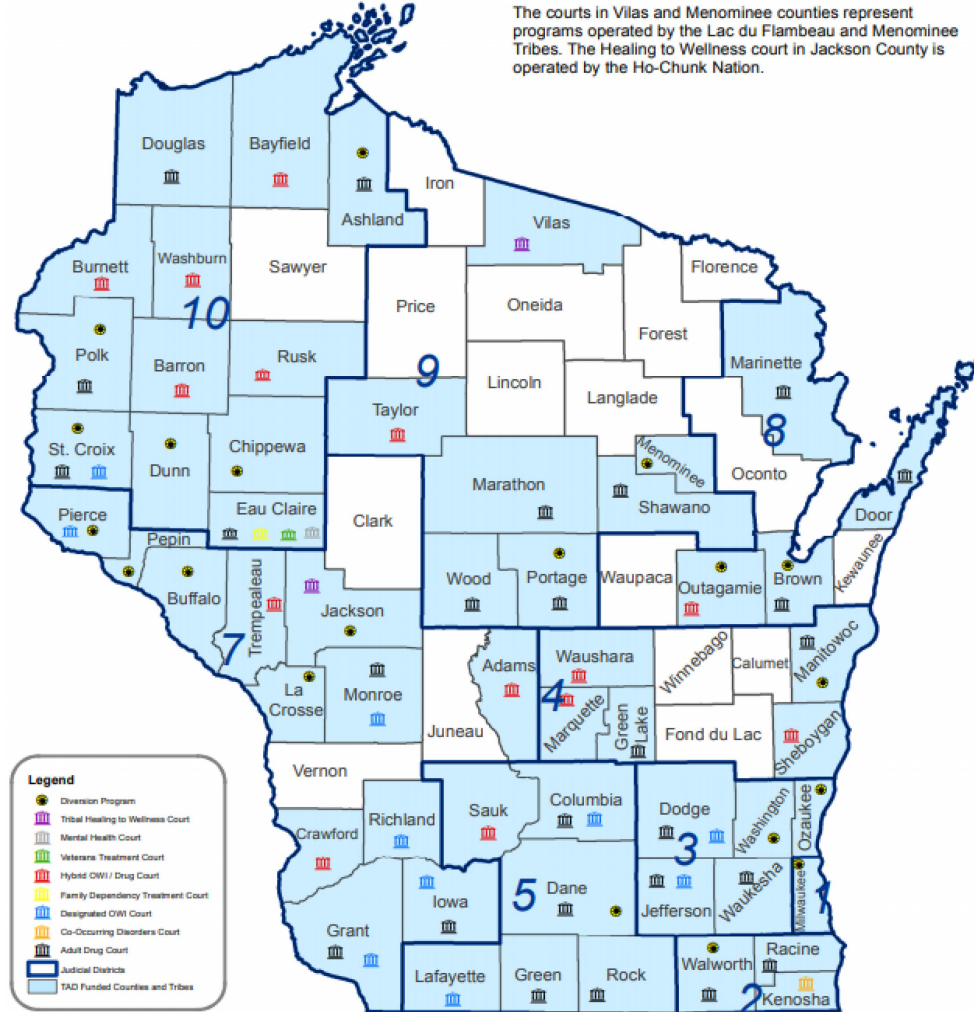

The courts in Vilas and Menominee counties represent programs operated by the Lac du Flambeau and Menominee Tribes. The Healing to Wellness court in Jackson County is operated by the Ho-Chunk Nation.



Current Competitive Funding Cycle

- ▶ Competitive funding round in 2021
 - ▶ End of the 5-year cycle
 - ▶ All counties and tribes must apply on a competitive basis
 - ▶ All funding is allocated based on the competitive funding process and the quality of the applications submitted
- ▶ \$7,188,900 available
 - ▶ Treatment courts can apply for up to \$150,000
 - ▶ There is a 25% match requirement (\$50,000 if awarded \$150,000)
 - ▶ Additional 2.5 million will be awarded competitively in 2023

- ▶ Determine your population
 - ▶ Find data and varying data sources to show the need
 - ▶ Overdoses/deaths
 - ▶ Out-of-home placements
 - ▶ OWI charges
 - ▶ Jail population
 - ▶ Drug charges and drug-related charges
- ▶ Determine your model
 - ▶ Drug court, OWI court, Hybrid court

- ▶ Main Summary
 - ▶ Brief project description
- ▶ Budget Detail
 - ▶ Personnel
 - ▶ Employee Benefits
 - ▶ Travel/Training
 - ▶ Supplies and Operating Expenses
 - ▶ Consultants/Contractual
- ▶ Budget Narrative
- ▶ Problem Description
 - ▶ Use data to support your problem statement!

Application Components (Continued)

- ▶ Project Design
 - ▶ Project Design Table
 - ▶ How will your project conform to the key components/standards
- ▶ Goals and Objectives
 - ▶ Reduce recidivism rates for nonviolent offenders in the program and increase public safety
 - ▶ Reduce prison and jail populations by diversion nonviolent offenders to community-based interventions
 - ▶ SMART
- ▶ Implementation Plan
 - ▶ Six-months of planning time
- ▶ Other Funding
- ▶ Letters of Support
