Call to Order – Chair James Schlender called the meeting to order at 8:30 am.

Certification of Compliance with the open meeting law was met. Roll Call was taken. Quorum was met.

Meeting Agenda --

Public Comments –

Minutes from previous meeting – A motion was made by Mr. Duffy to approve the minutes of the August 9, 2021, meeting; second by Ms. Hessel. Motion carried without negative vote.

Sawyer County Agricultural Fair Association Report – Mr. Christian stated that this year's fair was the best so far with good attendance and events. They are working on changes for next for a bigger draw and are now completing some capital improvements that were held off due to high materials costs.

University of Wisconsin-Extension Department Report – Ms. Gregoryan provided information on the September 22nd Clean Sweep project at the Fair Grounds to be held from 2-6pm. Ms. Baltrusis advised that the visioning session regarding the future of 4-H will likely be held in September.

Hayward Lakes Visitors & Convention Bureau Report – A written report was provided. Ms. Beckman stated that the website redesign is underway and should launch by October 1st. She has been writing several grants that have been successful. She reviewed the Featured Adventures programs stating that Sawyer County has 32 different adventures in 2021.

Northwest Regional Planning Commission – Mr. Johnson provided an update of several grant programs. The *Wisconsin Bounce Back* program to date has 47 applications going through approval with 12 of them being from Sawyer County hoping to receive the \$10,000 grants. The Sand Lake food pantry should open in Stone Lake very soon. The Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation *We're All In* program is open through June 2022 awarding small business grants ranging from \$2500-\$20,000 each. Sawyer County businesses have been awarded \$1,124,400 in grant funds county-wide thus far; the 3rd highest county receiving grants in all ten counties in the region.

Economic Development Report – A written report was provided. Mr. Gardner reported on various federal and state funding programs he has been helping county business owners with. The EDC is finalizing details to host a small business community forum on October 26th; other event dates include: EDC annual meeting on November 4th, Business After 5 co-hosted with Backroads Coffee on October 28th and the jail culinary training program that started on August

28th. Twenty-five participants signed up for the culinary training and only twelve will be selected through the screening process.

Motorized and Non-Motorized Trail Report – Mr. Duffy provided a written report from the Birkie. Mr. Mrotek reviewed the grant process used for trail maintenance funding. Sawyer County has been awarded \$230,000 in grant funds for Tuscobia Trail maintenance and LCO has been approved for funding nine miles of maintenance.

Meeting Date/Time – The next meeting of the Economic Development and UW-Extension Committee will be Monday, October 11, at 8:30 am in the Assembly Room.

4-H programming

Consistency and communication are essential for this program to be successful and I have to believe that the turn around in staff is a challenge for the overall health of the program. Having a consistent voice/face of Extension. An individual who is committed to and understands the dynamic of the area in which these youth live is essential. Unless you truly understand that it makes it very difficult to connect, relate and provide meaningful opportunities. The other very essential piece is communication. That has to be something that is consistent.

Providing after school opportunities for students is a huge need. A partnership or involvement from the Youth Development Program for schools in Sawyer County to help provide or enhance after school opportunities is vital. The youth development program could provide support and opportunities not otherwise possible.

From this area of the county we see many families that are missing the essentials of clean clothing and personal hygiene.

With all that COVID took away and the time spent distance learning I see many challenges with education and social skills.

How do you see Extension filling those educational needs? Do you see any gaps Extension could possibly fill now or in the future?

Having local decision makers and parents/families understanding the opportunities and values of Extension PYD programs.

Mentorship Programming- a chance for youth to connect with youth that could use a positive influence or trusted resource. This could help bridge the gap between ages, communities, genders, economic statuses, etc.

Homework support- perhaps we have individuals in our communities (retired school teachers for example) that would love a way to connect with our youth and give back but aren't sure how or where to go. With COVID restrictions it's become nearly impossible to let community members in to work with youth and our teachers are overtasked. Perhaps an online tutoring program for those our schools see falling behind or struggling.

Our area is not vastly populated with high needs youth, however, we do have some that suffer from learning disabilities. It would be great to be able to bring them together, offer those parents a support group of sorts. Perhaps twice a month so they can connect with each other. The support and comfort those parents could gain from connecting with those who live similarly challenging lives could be a huge benefit. It would also give the kids a chance to interact with a peer group they can relate better to. AND it could be taken a step further to look at ways to include them in a 4H project to give them a sense of community involvement and pride.

So many of our youth have become dependent on their phones and are incredibly tech savvy. With COVID continually limiting in person contact for our vulnerable populations, nursing homes etc it would be great to see a group of youth and/or adults that could go in and provide the basic how-to's of texting, sending photos, etc. Perhaps this could be an opportunity for community service, a leadership group experience, etc.

Workforce Development

- **Minong Access Commuter Project**
The Namekagon Transit in partnership with Jack Links Inc., Lac Courte Oreilles Tribe, Sawyer County Sheriff Court Services Division / Huber, and Sawyer County Lac Courte Oreilles Economic Development were awarded **\$99,540** from the National RTAP Community Rides Grant.
- **Workforce Innovation Grant Program**
Grant preparation in process for October 25 deadline with Northwest Regional Planning Commission. Northwest Wisconsin Workforce Investment Board, and regional partners. Early proposal considerations include graduate retention, increased diversity, equity, inclusion, and utilization of older workers.
- **Sawyer County Jail Culinary Academy**
The session was completed by eight inmates who earned certificates in the areas of Kitchen Cook, Real Career Work Readiness, Serve Safe for Food Handlers and Guest Services Tourism with an overall class average of 93.23%.

Business Technical Support

- **Wisconsin Tomorrow Main Street Bounceback Grants**
Assisted grant application and provided Letter of Acknowledgement for six applications. Grant amounts were \$10,000 per successful applicant.
- **American Rescue Plan Act – Economic Development Administration**
 - **Indigenous Communities:** working with LCO Planning / Grants Dept staff to scope and develop proposal.
 - **Travel, Tourism, and Outdoor Recreation:** met with Visitors & Convention Bureau and Chamber of Commerce to scope out early prospects for submittal. Met with Don Mrotek to discuss patterns and trail maintenance needs resulting from increased COVID-19 pandemic related use.

- Good Jobs Challenge: developing the prospects of and partners for developing a sectoral partnership (outdoor recreation) and companion small business / workforce training system.

Over half of Wisconsin's cities and villages are communities of fewer than 2,500 residents. Despite their large number, these small communities represent a wide variety of geographic and economic areas within the state. Because of their small size, these municipalities have unique issues and needs that are often very different from those of larger communities.

The tenth annual series of **Small Community Forums** will be held in four locations in October and November, to allow residents in these communities to come together, address common issues, network, share best practices, and identify strategies to address shared concerns. Representatives from many state and regional resource partners will be on hand to connect with attendees and provide guidance on specific concerns introduced during the sessions.

The forums are about sharing ideas, learning and networking concerning the health and future of rural Wisconsin. People interested in small town and rural Wisconsin are invited to attend, including those involved in quality-of-life issues, business, government, education, the nonprofit sector, civic and community development. Civic leaders, elected officials, volunteers, business leaders, educators, and local and regional economic development associations are encouraged to participate. Marketing/Communications

1. We will be mailing out our Birch Scroll magazine in mid-October to over 10,000 families.

Trail/Facilities

1. Birkie Trail is in good fall shape after a series of events. We will continue to do additional brushing and be ready for the snow to fly!
2. We plan to house a groomer this winter at Duffy Rd in our storage building to increase grooming from Hatchery Crk north.

Events/Programs

1. We had 1,003 for the Birkie Trail run and it was amazing! First "normal" feeling event in a long time and it was so fun! It was also the National Championship for the 1/2 marathon.
2. Some interesting data around our volunteers for a year of events:
 - There were 11,264 lines of data (ie, 11,264 total volunteer shifts)
 - Upon removing duplicates, there were 5,582 unique volunteers.
 - Some general stats about the volunteers:
 - Average age: 56 yo
 - 52% female, 48% male
 - 65% from WI, 27% from MN, 3rd closest state IL at 2%
3. Nearly 8,000 now registered for Birkie 2022. If registrations keep pace we will be close to the totals of 2020 when we had over 11,000 skiers.

Misc.

1. Registration for Trail Kids Winter will open soon. They meet at OO 2x a week and do a variety of outside activities on the trail afterschool.
2. Nordic Kids youth ski group will begin registration in the coming weeks as well - opportunity for 150 or so kids to learn to ski this winter at OO.
3. Hayward HS/MS hosted a conference CC running race at Hatchery on the Birkie Trail Oct 5 - over 250 kids our racing their hearts out!
4. On Oct 4th from 5-6pm at Anglers we had a little presentation for the Hayward businesses to get the latest info on Birkie 2022. We plan to have the chamber send out the materials we handed out so all can have who couldn't attend.

3 CITIZENS BY SAWYER COUNTY GOVERNMENT, BUSINESSES, AND EMPLOYERS

4 Resolution 2021-_____

5 **WHEREAS**, Wisconsin law requires the Sawyer County (the “County”) Board of
6 Supervisors (“County Board”) be sworn to uphold the Constitution of the United States of
7 America and the State of Wisconsin

8 **WHEREAS**, federal law prohibits employers from discriminating against an employee
9 or applicant because of the person's race, color, national origin, religion, sex, age, disability, or
10 genetic information, and the Wisconsin Fair Employment Act (WFEA) further prevents
11 discrimination because of an employee's sexual orientation, marital status, arrest or conviction
12 record, refusal to receive communication about religion or politics, and off-duty use or non-use
13 of a lawful product;

14 **WHEREAS**, local government, businesses, and organizations face legal recourse for
15 discriminating against protected classes of persons under state and federal law;

16 **WHEREAS**, many states recognized protected classes are a matter of individual choice
17 and persons who make individual choices about their health and medical decisions regarding
18 their body deserve protection from denial or termination of employment by the government,
19 businesses, and organizations;

20 **WHEREAS**, Sawyer County is currently suffering from a work-force shortage
21 and terminating otherwise qualified employees for refusing to accept an experimental vaccine
22 will potentially exacerbate the work-force shortage;

23 **WHEREAS**, no medical procedure has constitutionally been deemed medically
24 necessary by the United States or Wisconsin Supreme Court;

25 **WHEREAS**, religious exemptions are provided for certain government mandates under
26 the protected class status, while businesses and organizations are being allowed, and in some
27 cases encouraged, by the government to discriminate against a class of people who choose to
28 forgo elective medical procedures including immunizations;

29 **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, the Sawyer County Board of Supervisors
30 determines, adopts and directs the following:

31 1. The Recitals set forth above are true and accurate, and are therefore incorporated into
32 the Resolution and shall be used for reference.

33 2. Personal medical history and immunization status shall not be the sole reason for
34 denying or terminating employment within Sawyer County.

35 3. The Sawyer County Board of Supervisors affirms to impartially uphold the United
36 States and Wisconsin Constitutions and carry out the laws of our nation, our state, and the
37 county.
