Call to Order – Chair Ron Buckholtz called the meeting to order at 9:00 am. Roll Call taken. Quorum was met.

Certification of Compliance with the open meeting law was met.

Staff Recognition – Mr. Froemel and Richard Mullvain recognized EMS staff member, Bill Wymer, with the Annual Stemi Award of Excellence. Jim Onarheim is also going to receive an award in Madison for Volunteer of the Year.

Circuit Court --

Judge's Report—All three courtrooms are in session today.

Courthouse Remodel Update – No Update

Clerk of Court's Office Reports -

A written report was provided and reviewed. There are five jury trials scheduled for October; new case statistics were provided.

Sheriff's Department Report –

Communication Center Report – A written report was provided and reviewed. An update on staffing was provided by Ms. Ripczinski.

Patrol Report – A written report was provided and reviewed by Lt. Ripczinski. Sheriff Mrotek advised that the number of calls have decreased a bit from our busy summer. Deputy Mike Meyer-Saleh will be graduating the CVTC LE Academy program and will begin FTO patrol soon.

Jail Report – A written report was provided and reviewed by Chief Sajdera. The average daily population YTD is 72.32, 5 inmates are working Huber hours and the unemployment rate is 67%. The Huber program is starting to move forward with five workers being employed.

Communication Systems Specialist Report – No update

Town of Draper Emergency Services Communications Issues – Mr. Albarado advised that the County has fulfilled some records request for them and the Sheriff’s department is moving forward with the RFP process.

Code Enforcement Specialist – A written report was provided. Build-Up for the 2024 Licensing season is underway with the help of the Clerk’s Office; planning for the 2024 Rabies Vaccination Clinic is underway. New software for calls and admissions has proven invaluable for data and record keeping.

Emergency Management --

A written report was provided and reviewed by Ms. Ripczinski. A HazMat tabletop exercise was held on September 25th with the hospital staff, members of the HazMat team, public health and law enforcement. A training session is being offered on November 7 & 8, 2023 at the Sawyer County Sheriff’s Office Classroom entitled *Recovery from Disaster: The Local Community Role*.

Child Support Department Report --

Emergency Services --

Ambulance Report and AmRonbulance Billing – Written reports were provided and reviewed by Mr. Froemel. Call volume states and stats by township were included for YTD activity. The ambulance billing report details were reviewed. The EMR class in the Hayward High School has 10 students; it is hoped they will assist in future calls. They are averaging 120 calls/month.

Criminal Justice Coordinating Council Update -

Mr. Albarado provided a verbal update of activities. The Recovery Drug Court is moving forward taking in participants effective January 1st. The TAD grant application is underway.

Future items –

- Patrol call volume decreased from last month's report for October' 23 to **763**, the three-month trend shows: Aug' 23 was 921, while Sept' 23 was 782. This month was also a decrease from Oct' 22, which was 724 calls for service.
- For Oct 2023, Sawyer County Deputies in this period have issued **29** Citations for traffic offenses, **3** written warning and **8** Non-Traffic Citations. Per Community Maps: there have been **18** Total Crashes, **4** with Personal Injury, and **0** Fatalities in our County for this time period.

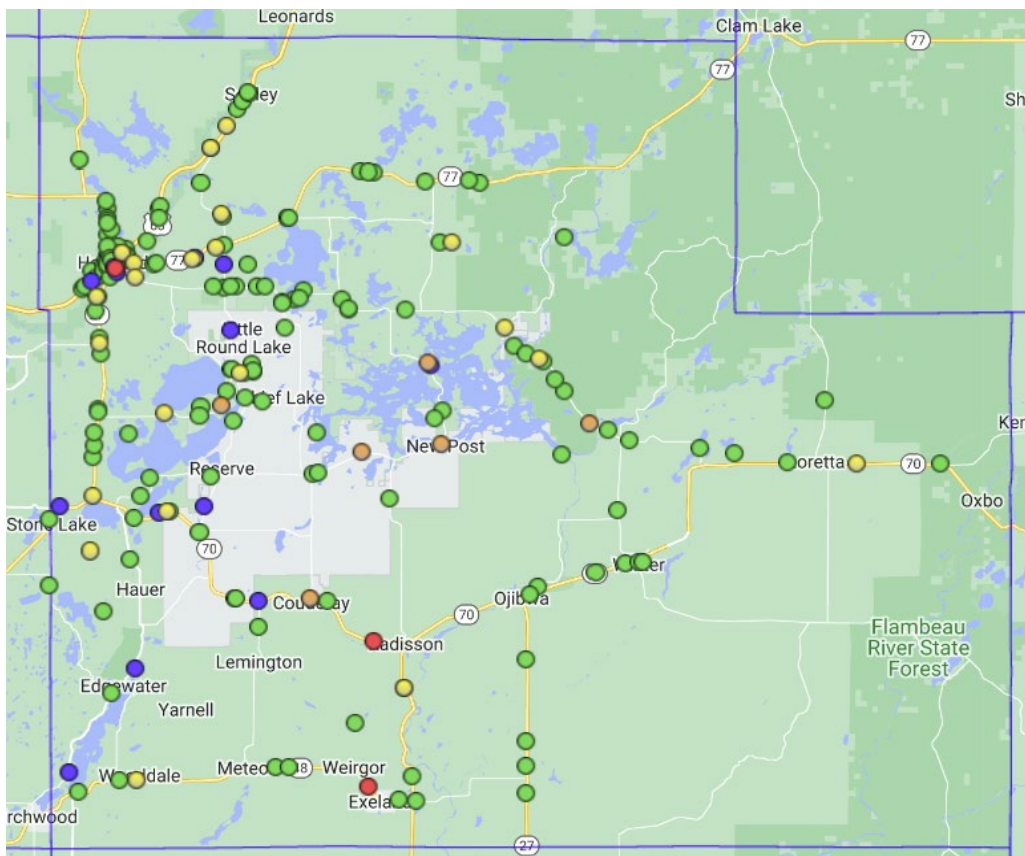

Sawyer County Communications System Specialist – November 2023 PS Committee Report

My apologies for not being in person as I have an education meeting that I need to attend for continued education/training. Updates with events are always provided directly when issues or work is taking place.

1.) **Fall/Winter Site Preparation:**

The Moose Lake and Meteor sites need new batteries as the winter storm last year put a toll on them and they have been in service for about three years. The power system needed is 48 volts so either a heavy duty 48-volt deep cycle, x2 24-volt deep cycle, or x4 12-volt deep cycle batteries would be needed.

2.) **MRGW at Dispatch** – After the rollback of the firmware updates operation has not had issues until last week. Dispatch advised that all the MRGW's (LAW-D and SWBASE 1 – SWBASE 5) was not working. However, SWBASE's at Pipestone was working without issue and dispatch was then dispatching via that site. The consoles were rebooted and then the issues seemed to correct themselves. No issues were reported with the state, but it did show that a redundant back-up will be installed at Pipestone as compared to waiting to use it if a failure of the one at Dispatch was to occur. Sawyer does have equipment for installation of the equipment at the site.

3.) **FIRE & LAW Crossovers at Pipestone** – These will be installed over the next 30 days as preparation needed to be made at the site to accommodate the feeds at the site.

4.) **Pipestone GPS Antenna** – It appears the antenna has become skewed on the mount on the ice tray. It will be repaired once the other equipment is installed at the site. It is currently working with no issues at this time.

5.) **Paging Clarification** – When Sawyer County pages they page on the paging channel which is analog (Conventional) and NOT on the WISCOM network. This is how pagers are activated and the traffic does NOT crossover to the WISCOM network. In addition, radios cannot scan across two networks (Conventional & WISCOM) at the same time. It was reported that pages are heard on the pager and not on the radio which is correct. The pagers monitor the Conventional channels and radios (for Fire and EMS) are on WISCOM.

The Lac Courte Oreilles Animal Control Officer salary is calculated at \$19.95/hour prorated to .75 FTE (Full Time Equivalent) for total \$29,640. The tribe will supplement .25 FTE of the Animal Control Officer salary to make this position full-time to meet community needs. Fringe benefits are calculated based on tribal employee benefits and prorated to .75 FTE and include federal employee health, dental at \$2,489.76, FICA at \$1,929.56, Medicare at \$1,073.61, Worker's comp at \$977.23, employer 401k match at \$933.66, totaling \$7,855.

Travel includes mileage expenditures for the animal control vehicle patrolling the reservation at \$0.655/mile for 6838 miles traveled per year (\$4,478.89).

Supplies include operational and uniform supplies such as files, pens, paper, storage as needed (\$50 x 12 months) for \$600 by the Animal Control Officer for record keeping and storage of data gathered and maintained. Additional supplies include \$1,884 to be used on for tactical clothing, jacket, and footwear, flashlights, animal constraint supplies such as catch poles, muzzles, leashes, etc.

Other expenses include contracted services, \$2,500 to assist with the cost of renting containment space at the local dog pound for animals picked up without an identified owner or are being removed from an undesirable environment, \$1,147.11 to advertise Animal Control Contact Information and community education information of proper animal control in the Sawyer County Record, and basic vehicle maintenance expenses for a total of \$3,648 including regular oil changes, vehicle registration, and other maintenance as needed.

The Tribe and the County law enforcement collaboration's mission is to promote the general welfare of all residents of Sawyer County; by providing improved law enforcement coverage thereby increasing their ability to protect life and property; to preserve public peace and maintain order, with focus on the Tribe's Reservation. Continued funding through the State of Wisconsin's Department of Justice's County and Tribal Law Enforcement Agreement Grant Program is necessary for the Tribe and County to achieve this mission.

The cooperative law enforcement program between the Lac Courte Oreilles Tribal Governing Board, Lac Courte Oreilles Tribal Police Department, Sawyer County Administration, and the Sawyer County Sheriff's Department will utilize the grant funding for support of salary, fringe, and operational expenses of the Lac Courte Oreilles Animal Control Officer. The Animal Control Officer will patrol and respond to animal complaints within Reservation boundaries, covering over 78,045 square acres including over 412 miles of State, County, BIA, Tribal and Town Roads.

The County is in full agreement as animal control is currently one of the most requested call for services to the Tribal Police Department, distracting law enforcement officers from higher priority calls for services, crimes, and incidents including but not limited to drug trafficking, domestic violence, sexual assault, traffic stops, theft, and robbery. As the more significant calls are being reported, having a shortage of available officers is causing these reports to be attended inefficiently.

Both Tribal and the Sawyer County Animal Control Officers will enforce the laws of the State of Wisconsin (the "State") and the County, along with the laws of the Tribe. As used in this Agreement, the "Tribe's Reservation" refers to the territory described in Article I, Section 1 of the Amended Constitution and Bylaws of the Tribe, in addition to all other land that qualifies as Indian country pursuant to 18 U.S.C. 1151. The County and the Tribe will administer the Program within Sawyer County, the fifth largest in the State, with 1,256 square miles. The population of Sawyer County was 18,295 (ACS, 2021). The Tribe currently has 8,432 enrolled Tribal Members of which 3,072 members reside on reservation (LCO Population Report, 12/31/2022).

Program's need for funding. Animal complaints are currently the number one request for services from the Lac Courte Oreilles Tribal Police Department. As the Lac Courte Oreilles Tribal Police Department is currently short-staffed; tribal police officers are limited in their ability to respond emergency calls due in part to substantial number of animal complaints occurring within Sawyer County and the Reservation boundaries. Additionally, the Sawyer County Sheriff's Department is also short-staffed and unable to respond to the excessive animal complaints. These needs are addressed with a dedicated Animal Control Officer to respond to calls from the community regarding animals and animal related reports. This will free up Tribal Police Officers and County Deputies to respond timely to all emergency calls including critical issues, with better efficiency.

There have been many dog bites that have happened within reservation boundaries, mostly impacting young children and some needing medical treatment at the Lac

Courte Oreilles Health Clinic or Hayward Area Memorial Hospital. In addition, the Lac Courte Oreilles Tribal Police Department received 79 animal complaints as of October 2023 this year alone.

Animal control within the reservation boundaries requires direct attention, this funding will support increased efforts for animal control on the Reservation to include implementation of animal complaint response protocols, increased enforcement of tribal animal control regulations and codes, maintenance of a database of animal vaccination/certifications of all dogs and cats within the reservation to protect public health, patrolling villages for animals at large and respond accordingly within protocols, and provide community education and promote awareness of proper animal/household pet care. Coordination with Sawyer County Animal Control Officer will complement and increase coverage for the Tribe and Sawyer County.

Administration of grant funding. The Lac Courte Oreilles Tribal Government, Lac Courte Oreilles Tribal Police Department, Sawyer County Government, and Sawyer County Sheriff's Department all agree, due to the numerous calls of animal complaints in Sawyer County and on the reservation, in addition to lack of staff to respond to serious reports, the County/Tribal Law Enforcement Assistance Grant funds most beneficial use are to support an Animal Control Officer staffed under the Lac Courte Oreilles Tribal Police Department and financially supplemented by the Lac Courte Oreilles Tribal Governing Board.

The Lac Courte Oreilles Tribal Government will accept the grant fund disbursement and will expend the funds in the form of payroll and accounts payables per expenditures received and will be responsible for the programmatic and fiscal compliance and reporting. The Lac Courte Oreilles Tribal Police Department's Director and Assistant Director will work closely with the Tribal Animal Control Officer to monitor performance and prepare and submit reporting to the Wisconsin Department of Justice. With support from the Lac Courte Oreilles Compliance Department staff budgets will be monitored to ensure expenditures via the grant are allowable per tribal and state regulations and all fiscal reporting will be submitted as stipulated by the State of Wisconsin, The Lac Courte Oreilles tribe and grant guidelines.

Law enforcement services provided. The main responsibilities of the Tribal Animal Control Officer will be to respond to investigations of animal mistreatment, rescue, and control of abandoned, dangerous, and abused animals from undesirable conditions, interact with public regarding proper animal care, and maintaining public health. The Animal Control Officer may also be responsible for the safe removal of dangerous animals that are causing disturbances to communities as directed by the Chief of Police and/or Conservation Director. The Sawyer County Animal Control officer and the LCO Animal Control officer will coordinate activities to ensure coverage for the Tribe's reservation and Sawyer County.

Additional duties will include examining animal licenses and compliance with ordinances established ensuring housing of animals is adequate, examining animals for maltreatment or injuries and arranging appropriate medical treatment as needed, investigating reports of animal attacks or animal cruelty and

interviewing witnesses, collecting evidence and writing reports, issue warnings and citations of animal related offenses and referrals to Tribal Court, develop and maintain a vaccination and animal license database, provide public education on animal welfare and animal control regulations, and prepare animal offense related prosecutions and give evidence in court.

Daily supervision and control. The Lac Courte Oreilles Tribal Police Department's Chief of Police, Tim Debrot, will be responsible for the daily supervision and control of the Animal Control Officer. Chief Debrot is primarily responsible for the scheduling, directing, and overseeing the activities and operations of the Lac Courte Oreilles Tribal Police Department ensuring coverage is maintained for effectively meeting the calls for service and needs of the Reservation.

Program planning and implementation. The program provides the coordination between the County and the Tribe regarding animal control law enforcement within the Reservation boundaries and maintaining effective law enforcement patrol of the County and Reservation. The Sheriff, Tribal Police Chief, and Public Safety Committee for the Tribe and County shall meet with the Tribal Governing Board and prepare detailed reports of the collaboration upon reasonable request. Discussion of the current law enforcement agreement program and additional strategies to meet the community's animal control and law enforcement needs will occur as needed.

Deputization, training, and insurance policies. The Lac Courte Oreilles Tribal Police Department and Sawyer County Sheriff's Department no longer cross deputize law enforcement officers. If Sawyer County Sheriff Department requests Lac Courte Oreilles Tribal Police Department's assistance on a call, the mutual-aid agreement provides for assistance between the law enforcement agencies. All officers employed by the Lac Courte Oreilles Police Department, in order to maintain employment as a law enforcement officer must complete 24 hours of in-service training and are covered by the Lac Courte Oreilles Tribal Police Department's insurance coverage policy.

Data collection and record keeping. The Animal Control Officer will prepare, complete, and maintain all records and data of animal related incidents and violations in accordance with applicable policies, procedures, and practices of the Lac Courte Oreilles Tribal Police Department. This includes types of complaints, animal licensure, current vaccinations, citations issues, and other pertinent information to the position. All data will be kept confidential as required by law. The Lac Courte Oreilles Tribal Police Department will ensure timely submission of annual and preliminary reports as requested by WI DOJ and as stipulated within the County and Tribal Law Enforcement Assistance Grant guidelines.

 - Citations are being issued more often in response.
 - Orders of correction to obtain county licenses are also being issued, owners are cited if not followed.
- Revenues are low due to the time of year.
 - Licensing for the 2023 period will end on November 1st.
 - Individuals who are in noncompliance will still be required to pay a deposit for their 2024 license.
 - License sales for 2024 start December 1st.
 - Impound and Boarding fees are low due to the number of dogs being transferred to the Northwoods Humane Society instead of going home.
- At-Large calls have been on the rise.
 - Some are never reported directly, but solved within community groups.
 - While getting dogs home is the ultimate goal, some repeat offenders take advantage of communities by allowing dogs to be at-large multiple times with no repercussions.

Code Enforcement

- Gained access to the Public Health file drive, allows for better integration and sharing.
- Cleaning up Zoning Violation letter templates to improve that process.

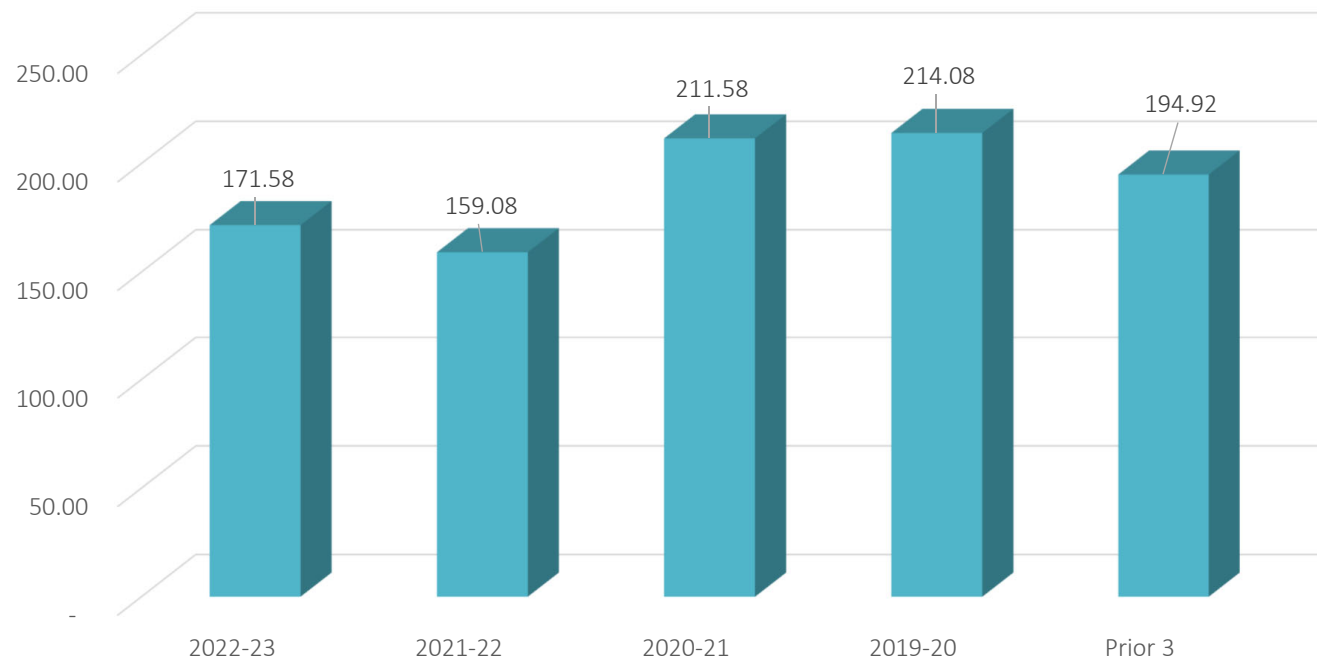

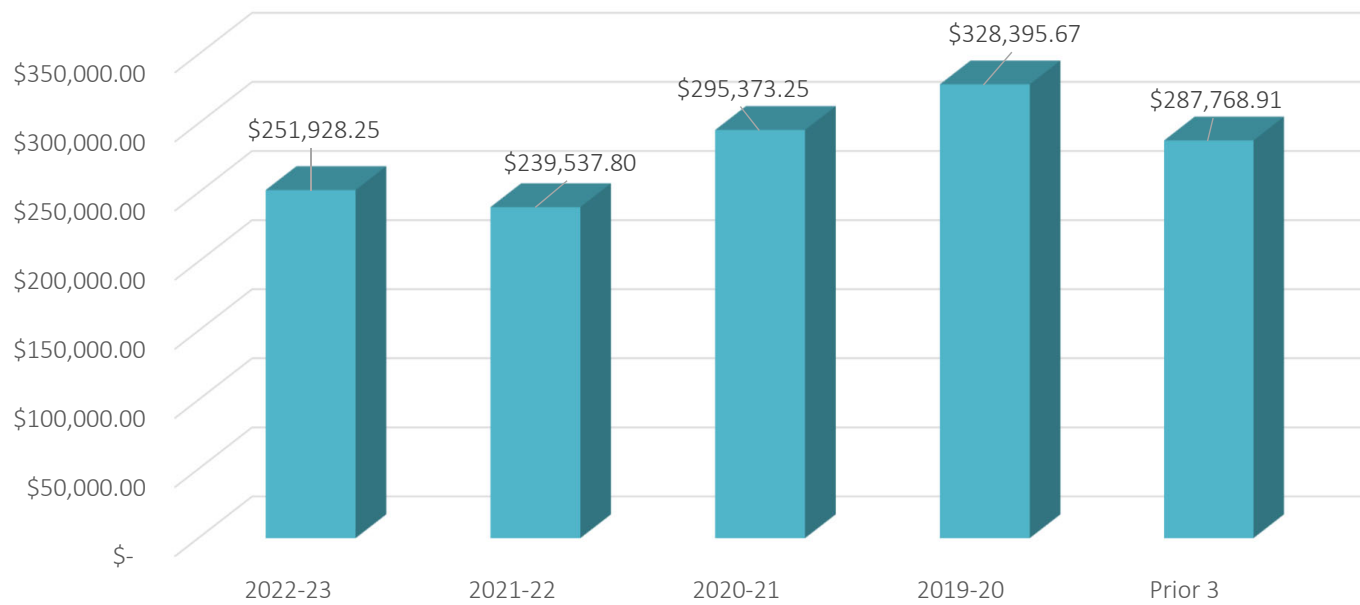

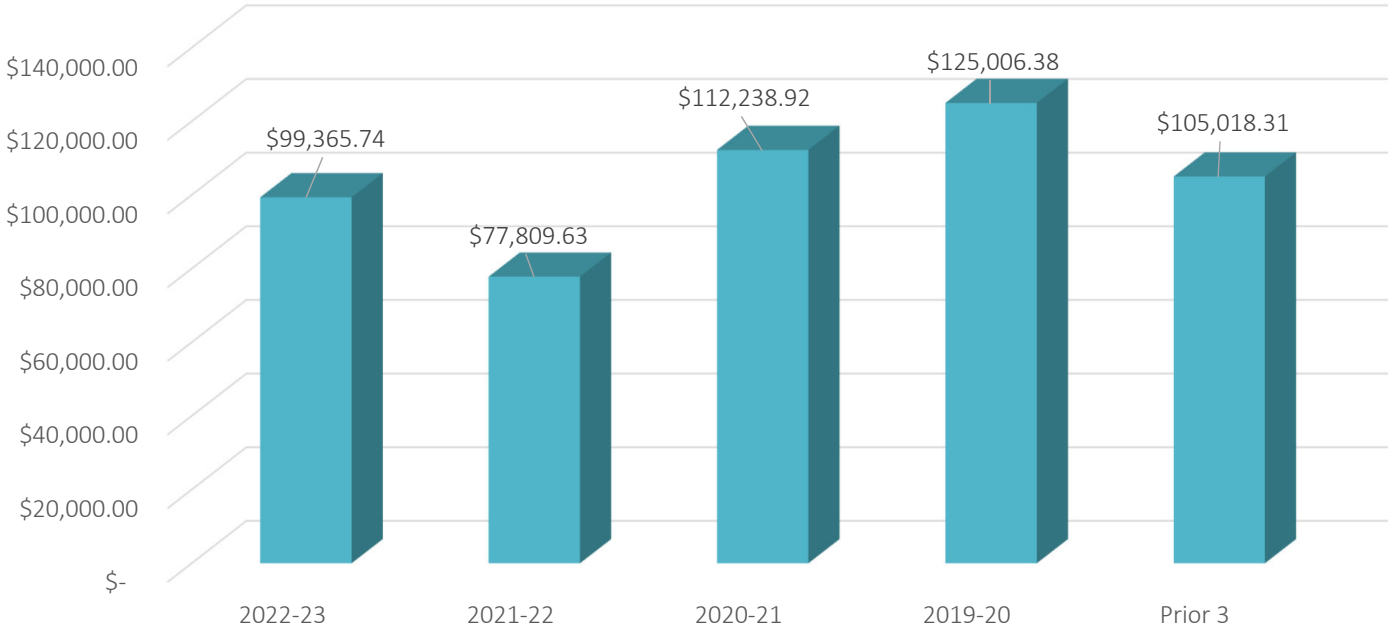
Average Calls per Month per Year
October-September



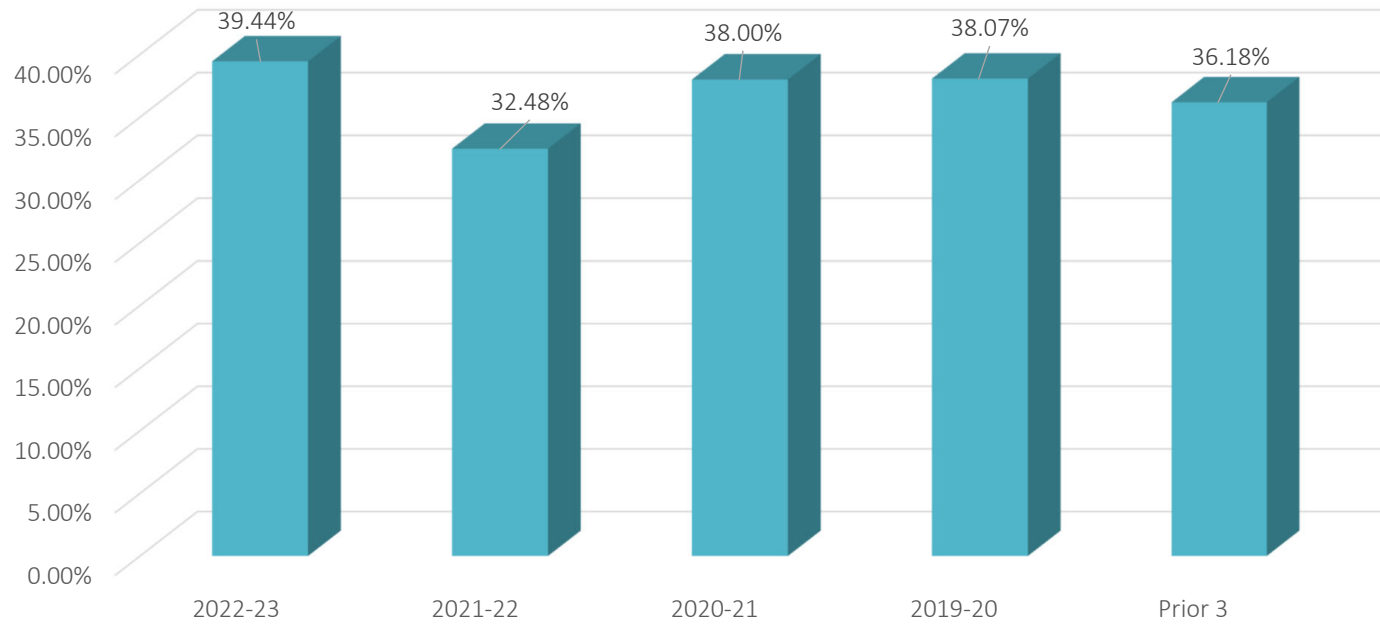
Average Billed per Month per Year
October-September



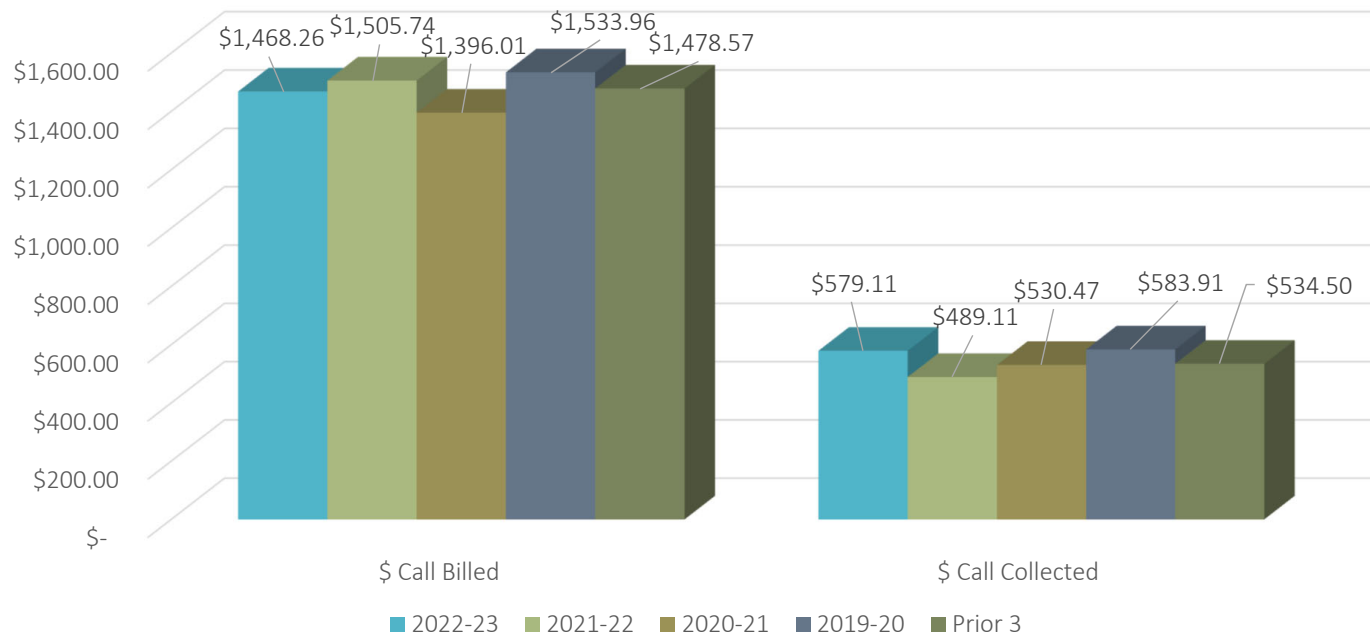
Average Collected per Month per Year
