Call to Order – County Clerk Fitch called the meeting to order at 9:00 am. Roll Call taken. Quorum was met.

Certification of Compliance with the open meeting law was met.

Elections – Clerk Fitch read the rules of the election for Chair and Vice Chair and opened the floor for nominations. Mr. Helwig nominated Mr. Buckholtz for position of Chair; there being no further nominations a voice vote was called and Mr. Buckholtz was appointed unanimously as Chair. Nominations were opened for Vice Chair. Mr. Buckholtz nominated Mr. Helwig for the position of Vice Chair; there being no further nominations, a voice vote was called and Mr. Helwig was appointed unanimously as Vice Chair.

Circuit Court --

Judge's Report –

Clerk of Court's Office Reports -

A written report was provided. A list of May jury trials was included as well as a list of new cases filed for the period March 26th through April 23rd. Revenue collected for the same period was \$35,979.99; wage income assignment receipted totaled \$1,318.99.

Sheriff's Department Report –

Patrol Report – Sheriff Mrotek congratulated supervisors on the recent elections. Next week is National Corrections Officer Week and then National Patrol Officers' Week. Lt. Ripczinski reviewed the patrol report statistics. Patrol call volume decreased from last month to 718; citation statistics were shared, and there have been auto crashes to date with 0 fatalities. Lt. Ripczinski advised that they will be hosting training in April focusing on Medication Assisted Therapy and Dementia, and they have been awarded a short-term Speed Enforcement Grant in the amount of \$11,844.

Jail Report – A written report was provided and reviewed by Lt. Woller. Total population at this time was 56 with 2 on electronic monitoring and 1 on working Huber privileges. The unemployment rate is 72%

Communication Center Report - A written report was provided. Director Ripczinski advised that three individuals have been interviewed for dispatch with one beginning training soon. Dispatchers attended Dementia training recently. They have been working with GenComm and WisCom with the radios.

Communication Systems Specialist Report – A written report was provided and was introduced by Mr. Albarado. He advised that the areas needing to be addressed include the assessment of the current radio system and then determine what could be improved to increase coverage. The current equipment cannot be greatly improved. Portable coverage we want to move toward 95% coverage throughout the county so improvement is needed. We need to boost towers to improve service and add a new site access in Meteor, LCO, Loretta and Birchwood which will likely involve building two new towers. We will get an estimate for these new services at an estimated cost of \$2M at the next meeting. Mr. Jenneman shared photos of existing facilities that could be improved.

Emergency Management Report – A written report was provided. Director Ripczinski continues to work with municipalities on improvements of services and plans. She will be hosting an emergency planning course in October. Mr. Albarado presented the MOU between the County and the Search and Rescue Team to align with the County objectives. This would formalize roles and responsibilities of both parties and allow our insurance company to cover them. This will also formalize that SAR is directed by the County with the 30+ volunteers in the organization.

Code Enforcement Specialist – Ms. Olson introduced herself as the new Code Enforcement Specialist. She continues to get many calls for dogs at large.

Child Support Department Report --

A written report was provided showing that there are 1123 open cases. For the month of March there was \$732,932.02 in support due and \$525,427.17 collected.

Emergency Management --

Written reports were provided and reviewed. To date there has been 28 doses of Narcan given within the community which indicates an increase in overdoses. Mr. Froemel and Mr. Onarheim are attending the WCMEA conference in June and will be guest speakers; EMS week is May 19-25th and they will host a picnic at Hay Creek for staff. He shared photos of the new counterfeit prescription pills which contain high levels of fentanyl, and they are coming from the southern part of the state.

Criminal Justice Coordinating Council Update -

Mr. Albarado reported that the CJCC committee signed off on the TAD grant letter of support last month and discussed options for legal aide resources. There are an increased number of youth justice referrals and placements creating higher costs and issues in staff shortages. The Sawyer County/LCO MOU for CJCC financial support is due for renewal and we have received word from LCO that they do not want to renew their financial support.

Meeting Date/Time – The next meeting of the Public Safety Committee will be Thursday, June 6th at 9:00 am in the Board Room.

Meeting adjourned at 9: 55 am.

- Patrol call volume increased from last month's report for May '24 to **1020**, the three-month trend shows: Mar '24 was 718 while April '24 was 659 This month was also an increase from May '23, which was 852 calls for service.
- For May 2024, Sawyer County Deputies in this period have issued **35** Citations for traffic offenses, **26** written warning and **70** Non-Traffic Citations. Per Community Maps: there have been **21** Total Crashes, **5** with Personal Injury, and **0** Fatalities in our County for this time period.

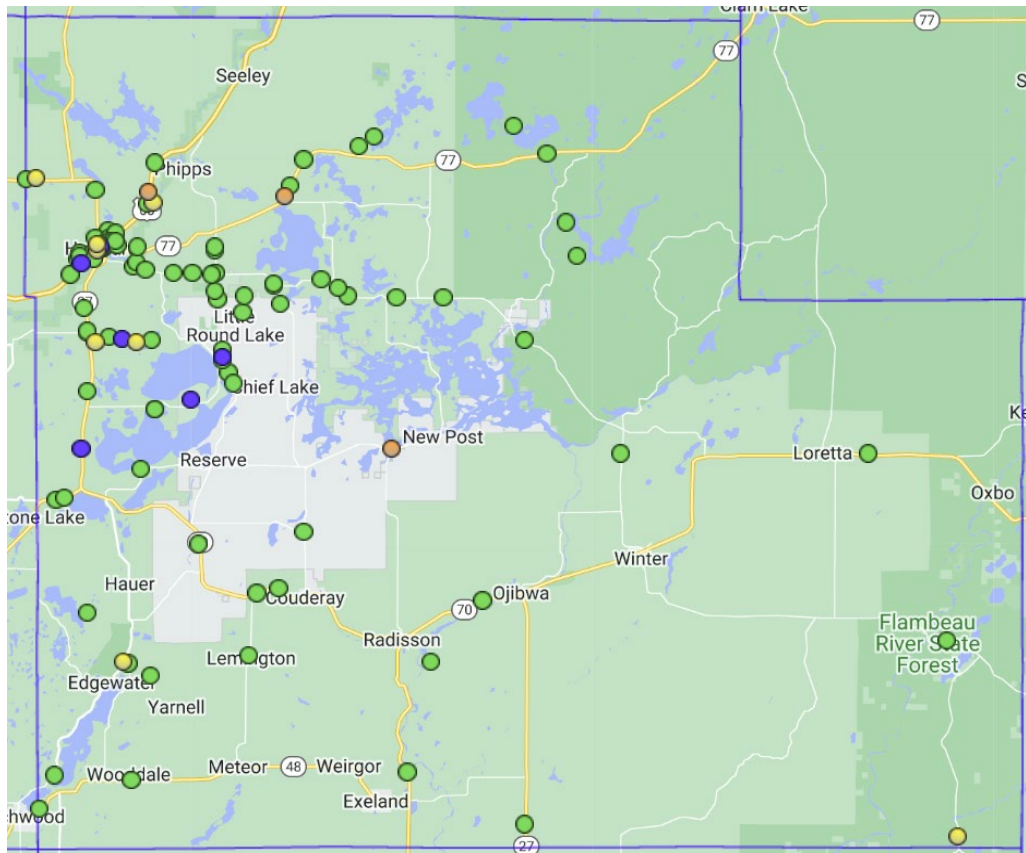

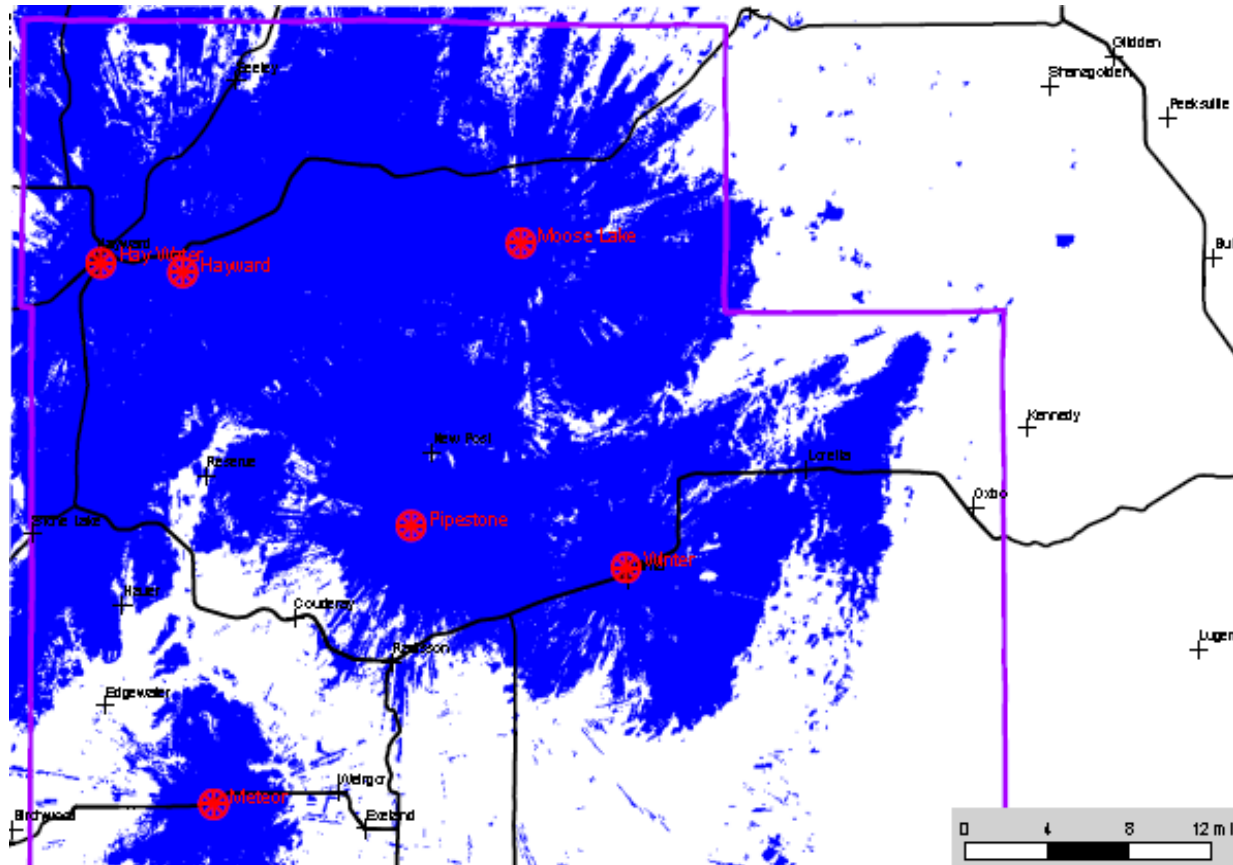


Existing Mobile Coverage



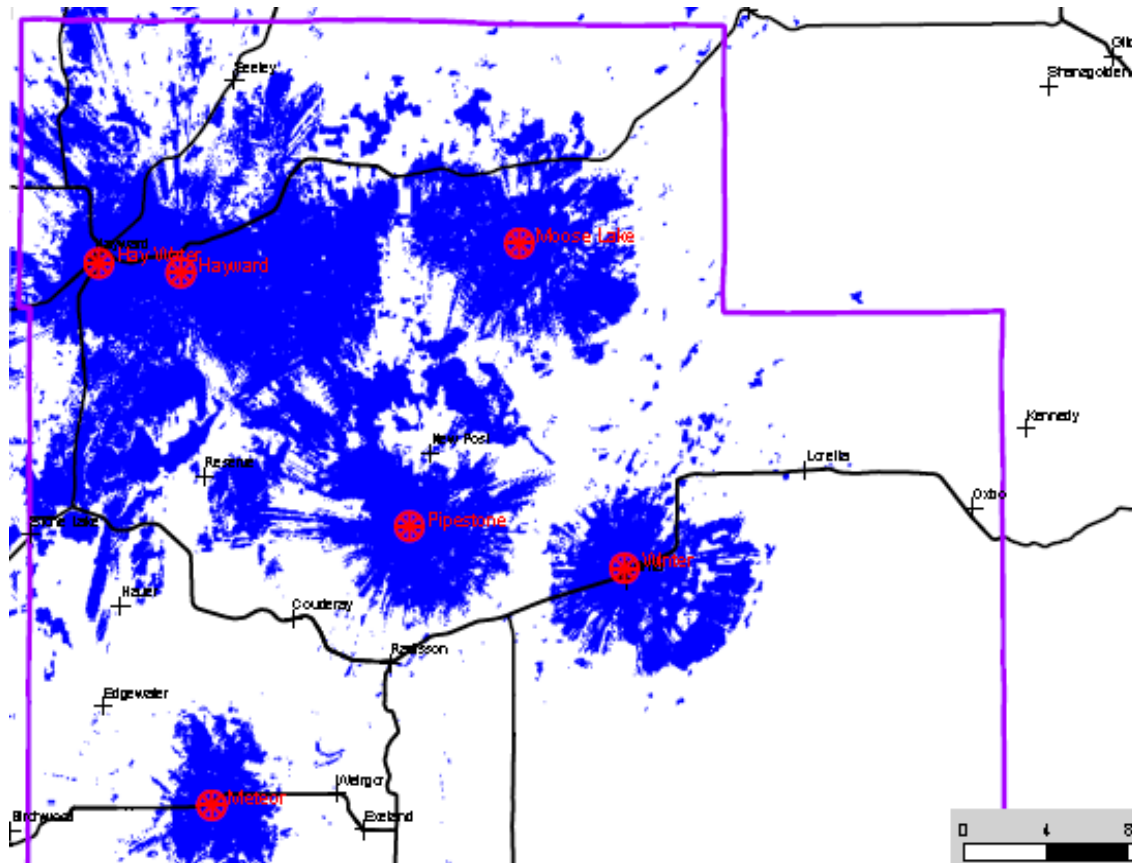

The current radio system is falling short in terms of providing reliable mission critical coverage for Sawyer County Sheriff's Department, Sawyer County Ambulance, Hayward Police Department, and 8 local fire departments. Some of your equipment is not supported and is no longer manufactured. We recommend a wholesale replacement to a system architecture that emergency services use extensively in the US. 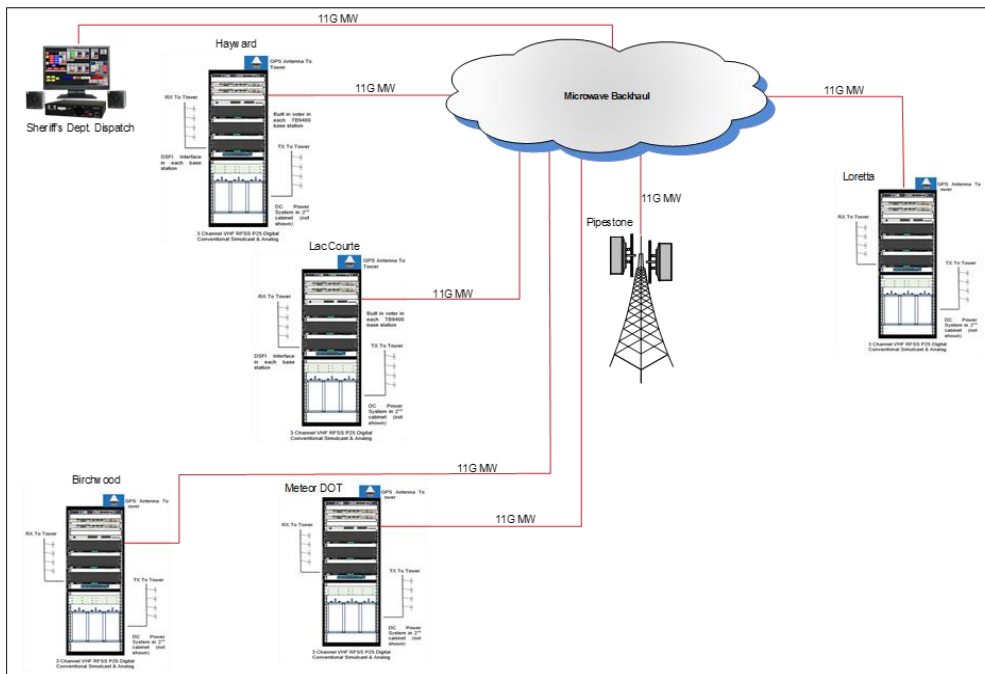

Detailed 5-Site System Diagram



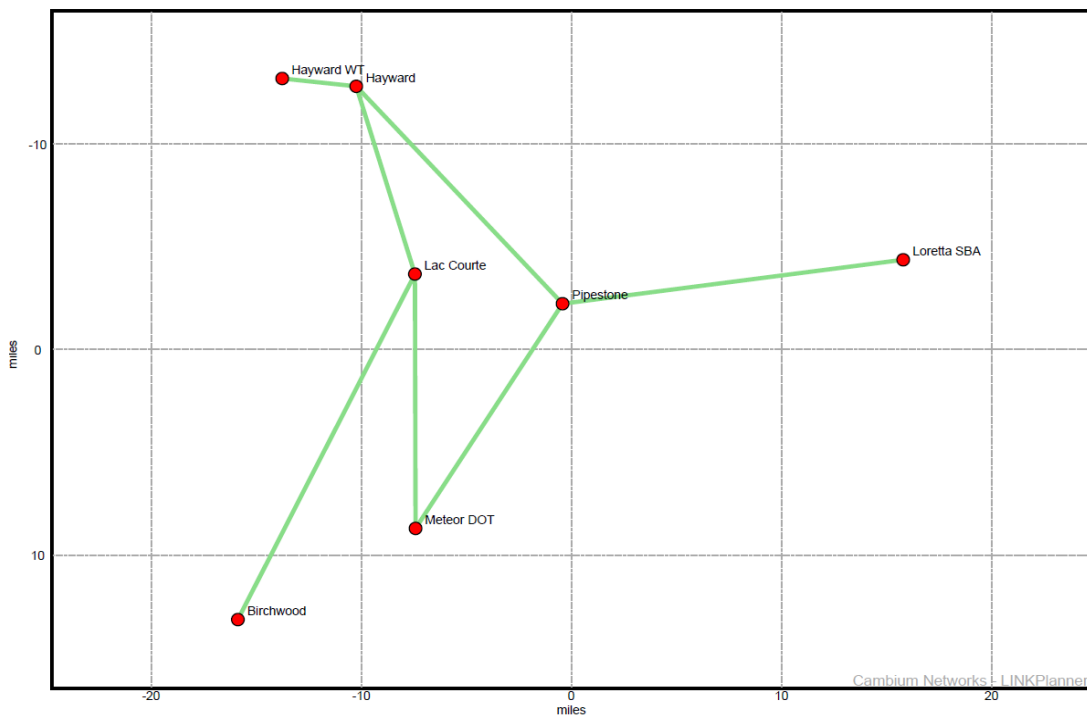

Microwave System:

We recommend a licensed microwave system to provide you with a robust system that utilizes equipment from our Vendor **Cielo Networks**. We developed a network with 4 sites in a ring and 3 sites with a 1+1 hot standby protection with (2) CG2X units. We are using the 11GHz band to reduce dish sizes but could use the 6GHz band for less path fade. The system will be equipped for adaptive modulation up to 1024 QAM to provide scalable up to 150 Mbps of layer 2 capacity with a 99.999% annual 2-way availability at the time of installation. Pipestone will be used as a pass-through site to reach Loretta.

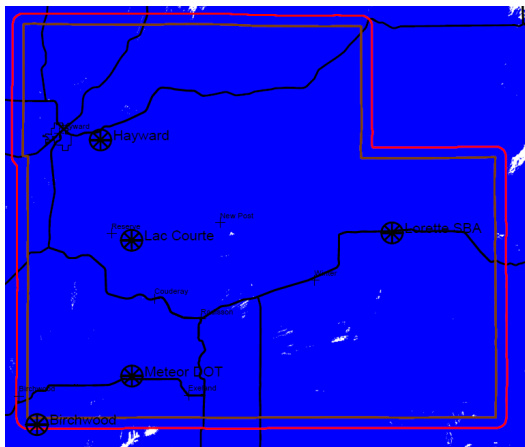

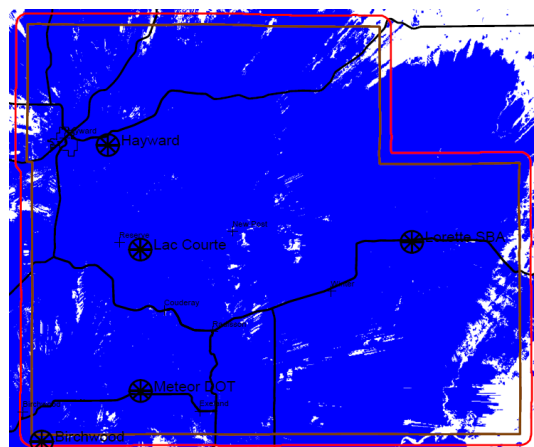

EXHIBIT A: Amendment to Animal Control Ordinance

EXHIBIT A – AMENDMENT OF ANIMAL CONTROL ORDINANCE.

Sec. 4-2-2 of the Animal Control Ordinance shall be amended to read as follows (added text noted in underscore):

Sec. 4-2-2. Permit issuance and requirements.

- (a) *Permit required.* No Person shall engage in any activity described in this article without first obtaining a Permit in compliance with and as required by this article.
- (b) *Application for Permit.* An applicant shall complete a Permit application obtained from the Animal Control Officer. An applicant shall return the completed application, any additional materials supporting the application, and the required fee to the Animal Control Officer. Application fees shall be set by the County Board of Supervisors and stated within an application. The Animal Control Officer shall issue the Permit within ten days of receiving a complete Permit application, so long as the following conditions are met:
 - (1) Applicant and Permittee have not withheld or falsified any information on the Permit application.
 - (2) Applicant and Permittee shall agree to comply with all terms of the Permit.
 - (3) Applicant and Permittee shall acknowledge this article's requirements and agree to comply with all terms of this article, any regulations established by the County Board of Supervisors, and any other Applicable Laws, including but not limited to, Wis. Stats. Chs. 95, 173, and 174 and Wis. Admin. Code Ch. ATCP 16.
 - (4) Applicant and Permittee shall agree to allow the Animal Control Officer to inspect all Animals and the Premises at any reasonable time.
 - (5) Applicant and Permittee shall acknowledge that any violation of the terms of the Permit, this article, or any other Applicable Law shall result in revocation of the Permit.
 - (6) Applicant or Permittee may not have been convicted of any civil, criminal, municipal or other violation for mistreatment of Animals.
- (c) *Permit Period.* A Permit Period shall begin with the first day of the calendar year and shall run for one year. Renewal applications for Permits shall be made no later than 30 days prior to the start of the calendar year. A Breeding Permit Period shall be as set forth in Sections 4-2-1(9) and 4-2-6(b).
- (d) *Change in ownership.* If there is a change in ownership of a Commercial Animal Establishment, the new Owner may have the current Permit transferred to the new Owner upon payment of a transfer fee in the amount established by resolution and upon assumption of all obligations of the Permit holder.
- (e) *Permit required.* The following uses require a valid Permit issued by the Animal Control Officer:
 - (1) Breeding Facility.
 - (2) Kennel.
 - (3) Pet Shop.
 - (4) Riding Stable.
 - (5) Auction.
 - (6) Zoological Park.
 - (7) Circus.

- (8) Grooming Shop.
- (9) Petting zoo.
- (10) Guard dog training center.

Permit fees can be found in the Sawyer County Fees & Payments Schedule adopted by the Sawyer County Board of Supervisors, as may be amended.

- (f) *Permit conditions.* A Permit may contain any term, condition, requirement or standard that the Animal Control Officer deems necessary in order to protect the health, welfare and safety of the public and of any Animal that is or may be subject to the terms of the Permit.
- (g) *Compliance with zoning ordinance.* All Commercial Animal Establishments must comply with any underlying County zoning ordinances and may only be conducted in zoning designations where allowed as a permitted use or as a conditional use.
- (h) *Separate enterprise.* Every Commercial Animal Establishment or other facility regulated by this article shall be considered a separate enterprise requiring an individual Permit. Any change in the use or facility operation for which a Permit was issued shall require a new application and a new Permit for each additional use or change in facility operation.
- (i) *Review of decision.* Any Person aggrieved by the County's failure to issue a Permit may appeal the Animal Control Officer's decision to the County Public Safety Committee. The County Public Safety Committee shall review the Permit application and render a determination whether to uphold the Animal Control Officer's decision to deny the Permit.
- (j) *Failure to renew – Double Permit Fee.* Any Person that fails to submit their renewal application 30 days prior to the start of the calendar year shall be subject to a double permit fee.
- (k) *Fine for Failure to Renew Permit.* Any Person that fails to renew their Permit required under this Sec. 4-2-2 within 30 days after the start of the calendar year may also be subject to a fine of not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$500.00 per day of violation, as set forth in Sec. 4-2-21 and as may be amended by the County Board of Supervisors.

Sec. 4-2-10 of the Animal Control Ordinance shall be amended to read as follows (added text noted in underscore):

Sec. 4-2-10. - Restraint.

- (a) *Requirement.* All Animals shall be kept under Restraint and shall not be permitted to run-at-large.
- (b) *Public Nuisance Animals and Public Nuisance Animal Owners.* All Owners shall exercise proper care and control of their Animal to prevent them from becoming a Public Nuisance Animal or other public nuisance as defined by any Applicable Law.

- (1) The Animal Control Officer may declare an Animal as a Public Nuisance Animal after investigation and determining, within the Animal Control Officer's reasonable discretion, that the Animal is a Public Nuisance Animal. Any Owner of an Animal declared a Public Nuisance Animal under this Sec. 4-2-10(b) shall be declared a Public Nuisance Animal Owner.
- (2) The Animal Control Officer shall notify the Public Nuisance Animal Owner of the declaration in writing by personal service or by certified mail with the return receipt.
- (3) Any Public Nuisance Animal Owner aggrieved by said declaration may petition the County Public Safety Committee for a review of the declaration in accordance with the procedure set forth herein.
 - (a) The Public Nuisance Animal Owner shall submit a petition to the County Public Safety Committee with a copy to the Animal Control Officer.
 - (b) Upon receipt of the petition, the County Public Safety Committee shall schedule a hearing at the next regular meeting of the County Public Safety Committee. In the event that the petition is received within seven days of the next regular meeting, the hearing shall be scheduled at the next monthly meeting. The hearing shall be conducted in accordance with the procedures outlined in Wis. Stat. § 68.11(2) and (3). The County Public Safety Committee shall render its determination within 30 days of the hearing and notify the Public Nuisance Animal Owner of its decision in writing. If the County Public Safety Committee upholds the declaration, the Public Nuisance Animal Owner shall comply with the provisions of this Sec.4-2-10 in accordance with a time schedule established by the Animal Control Officer or the County Public Safety Committee, but in no case more than 30 days subsequent to the date of determination upholding the declaration.
- (4) A Public Nuisance Animal Owner shall ensure that all its Animals do not engage in any of the following conduct:
 - (a) Remain unrestrained or at large off the Public Nuisance Animal Owner's property or property where permission is granted.
 - (b) Damage the property of anyone other than its Public Nuisance Animal Owner.
 - (c) Molest or intimidate pedestrians or passersby.
 - (d) Chase vehicles.
 - (e) Excessively make disturbing noises, including but not limited to, continued and repeated howling, barking, whining, or other utterances causing unreasonable annoyances, disturbance, or discomfort to neighbors or others in close proximity to the Premises where the Animal is kept or harbored.

- (f) Cause fouling of the air by odor and thereby creates unreasonable annoyance or discomfort to neighbors or others in close proximity to the premises where the Animal is present.
 - (g) Cause unsanitary conditions in enclosures or surroundings where the Animal is present.
 - (h) Attack other domestic Animals or people.
- (5) Violations of any prohibited conduct by an Animal owned by a Public Nuisance Owner shall be punishable by fines of no less than \$25.00 and no more than \$500.00 per offense.
- (c) Every female dog or cat in heat shall be Confined in a building or secure enclosure in such a manner that such female cannot come into contact with another Animal except for a planned breeding.

Sec. 4-2-18 of the Animal Control Ordinance shall be amended to read as follows (added text noted in underscore):

Sec. 4-2-18. - Enforcement.

- (a) The civil and criminal provisions of this article shall be enforced by the appointed Animal Control Officer or law enforcement within the County.
- (b) The Animal Control Officer or law enforcement within the County personnel are authorized to catch and impound Animals-at-Large, with such authorization to include the pursuit of Animals upon private property. It shall be a violation of this article to interfere with the Animal Control Officer or law enforcement in the performance of their duties.
- (c) During investigation of suspected violations of statutes or ordinances, the Animal Control Officer may enter any building, vehicle, or place where Animals may be present for the purpose of inspection, examination of Animals, or the gathering of evidence. If the building, vehicle, or place to be entered is not public, and consent of the Owner or person in charge is not obtained, an inspection warrant under Wis. Stat. § 66.0119 may be obtained.

Sec. 4-2-21 of the Animal Control Ordinance shall be deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following (added text noted in underscore):

Sec. 4-2-21 Penalty.

- (a) Any person that violates any provision of this article shall be subject to a penalty in the form of forfeiture of \$100.00 for each violation.
- (b) Each day a violation of this article exists shall constitute a distinct and separate violation, and forfeitures and costs shall apply to each violation.
- (c) In addition to any forfeiture and costs for violation of this article, the County may seek other such relief, legal or equitable, that is available.

(d) In addition to any forfeiture, the person shall also pay court costs and the reasonable costs incurred by the County or its designee as set forth in the Wisconsin Circuit Court Fee, Forfeiture, Fine and Surcharge Table, as it may be amended in the future, and a copy of which is set forth below.

Background:

The Sawyer County Search and Rescue Team (SAR) and the Sawyer County Sheriff's Department (Department) recognize the importance of collaborating and coordinating efforts to enhance public safety and effectively respond to search and rescue missions and emergencies within our jurisdiction.

Purpose:

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) establishes a framework for cooperation and collaboration between the SAR and the Department to facilitate operations, training exercises, information sharing, and resource allocation in support of search and rescue efforts and emergency response activities. In addition, this MOU serves as recognition that SAR operates under the authority of the Sheriff's Department and exists and operates under Sawyer County Government.

Terms of Agreement:

1. Operations and Administration:

- Sawyer County Search and Rescue will operate under the direction of the Sheriff/Sheriff's Department.
- The SAR Commission will be chaired by the Sheriff.
- The SAR Commission will be responsible for verifying training requirements, approving new SAR members, and approving Standard Operating Procedures.
- The parties agree to collaborate and conduct joint search and rescue operations as necessary and appropriate, at the Direction of the Sawyer County Sheriff.
- SAR is able to conduct search and rescue and operations in other jurisdictions with the authorization of the Sawyer County Sheriff.
- Each party will designate liaisons to coordinate administration, communication, and logistics for operations.
- SAR will be led by and operate with volunteers.

- SAR will provide a list of volunteers annually to Sawyer County.
- SAR will maintain a command structure to coordinate their efforts.
- Sawyer County recognizes SAR as an affiliate or program of the Sheriff's Department – operating under the Sheriff's authorization and direction.
- Sawyer County will maintain a SAR fund to account for donations and expenses.
- Sawyer County will work with their insurer to extend coverage to the activities of SAR.

2. Training and Exercises:

- The parties will participate in training exercises to enhance interoperability and preparedness for search and rescue missions and emergency situations.
- Training schedules and objectives will be developed and may include drills, simulations, and other exercises.
- SAR shall annually provide to the Department a summary of training activities performed.

3. Information Sharing:

- The parties will share relevant information, including incident reports, maps, intelligence, and resources, to support effective decision-making and response coordination.
- Information sharing will be conducted in accordance with applicable laws, regulations, and protocols for the protection of sensitive and confidential data.

4. Resource Allocation:

- The parties will coordinate the allocation and deployment of personnel, equipment, and other resources based on the needs of each operation or emergency.
- Resource sharing and mutual aid agreements may be established to ensure the efficient use of available assets and capabilities.
- SAR will maintain a list equipment and the locations of the equipment location. This equipment will be considered property of the County and assigned to SAR. The County will insure all equipment.
- Should SAR cease to exist all equipment is to be returned to the Department.

5. Public Outreach and Education:

- The parties will collaborate on public outreach and education initiatives to promote safety awareness, emergency preparedness, and community resilience.
- Joint outreach efforts may include workshops, presentations, social media campaigns, and other activities to engage and inform the public.

Duration and Amendment:

This MOU shall become effective upon signature by both parties and shall remain in effect until terminated by mutual agreement or by either party with 90-day prior written notice. This MOU may be amended or modified by mutual consent of the parties in writing.

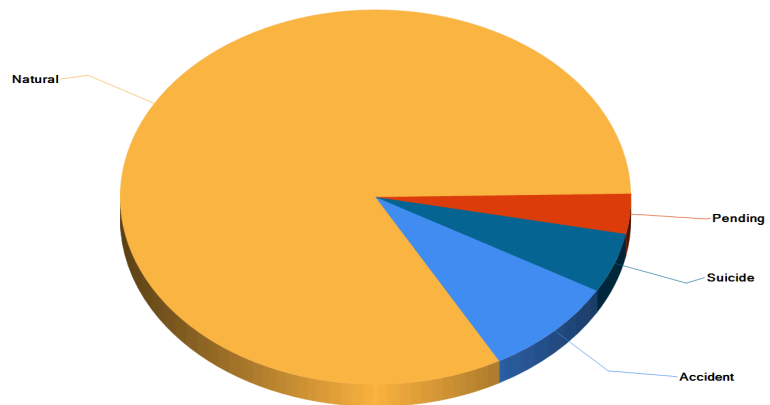

Eric Lundmark and Jay McDonald have successfully completed their Orientation period and are very active on the roster as RN's for transfers and as Paramedics for 911 shifts. Our part-timers have been integral in filling shifts (especially power truck shifts) and taking transfers. After the pay raises we have seen an increase in activity on the roster and more shifts being bid on and filled. We have seen an increase in our interfacility transfer numbers especially toward the end of the month as Eric and Jay finished orientation. This month, 14 transfers were taken out of Tamarack Health – Hayward, Spooner, and MMC-Ladysmith. These last two weeks of May, 10/14 days were fully staffed and 6 transfers were taken. I cannot impress how important having a fully staffed day is to both 911 and transfer coverage. Memorial Day Weekend (Friday through Monday) there were 27 EMS incidents alone. Crews worked hard and successfully managed multiple high acuity calls. 4 transfers were taken and we responded to two mutual aid/ intercept requests as well as managing 21 of our own county's 911 calls. Events The ambulance participated in events at Hayward elementary school and the LCO elementary school this month as well as provided a demonstration for local Girl Scouts at the Hayward Library. We also coordinated coverage with the DNR for their ranger pack testing. Lastly an AED was used successfully for a save at the Wesleyan Church. It's a testament to the hard work and community out reach with AED and CPR training that the Ambulance service has been doing throughout the community with the help of Jim Onarheim.

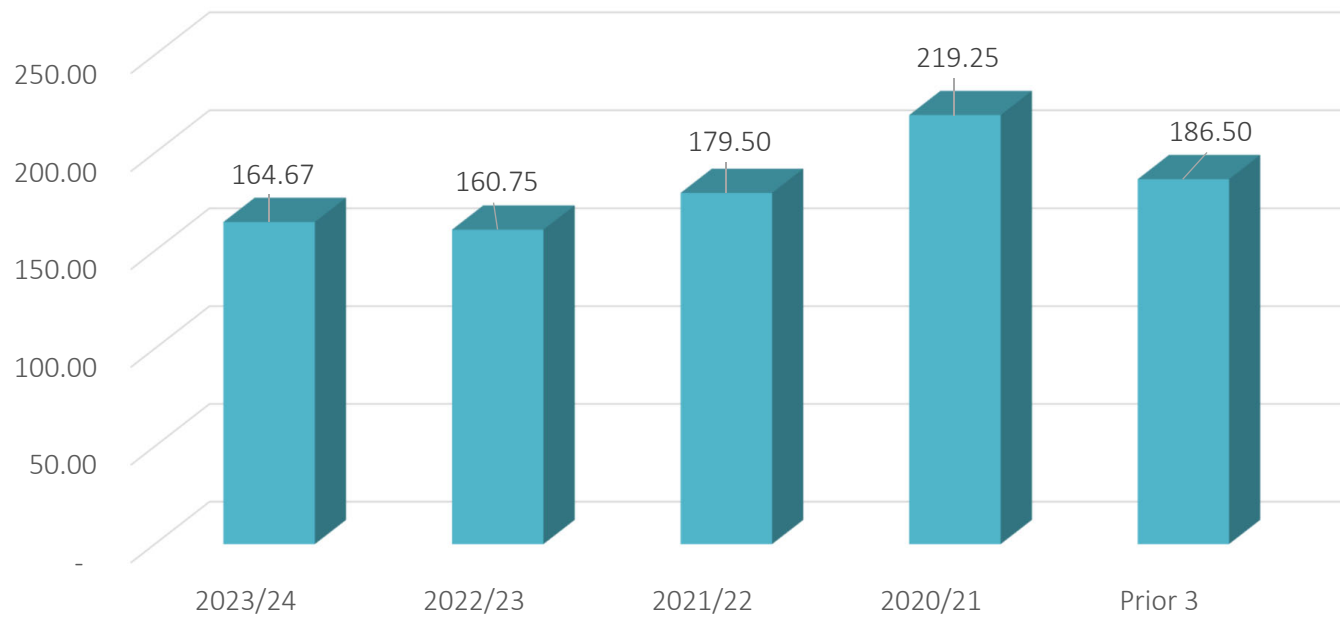

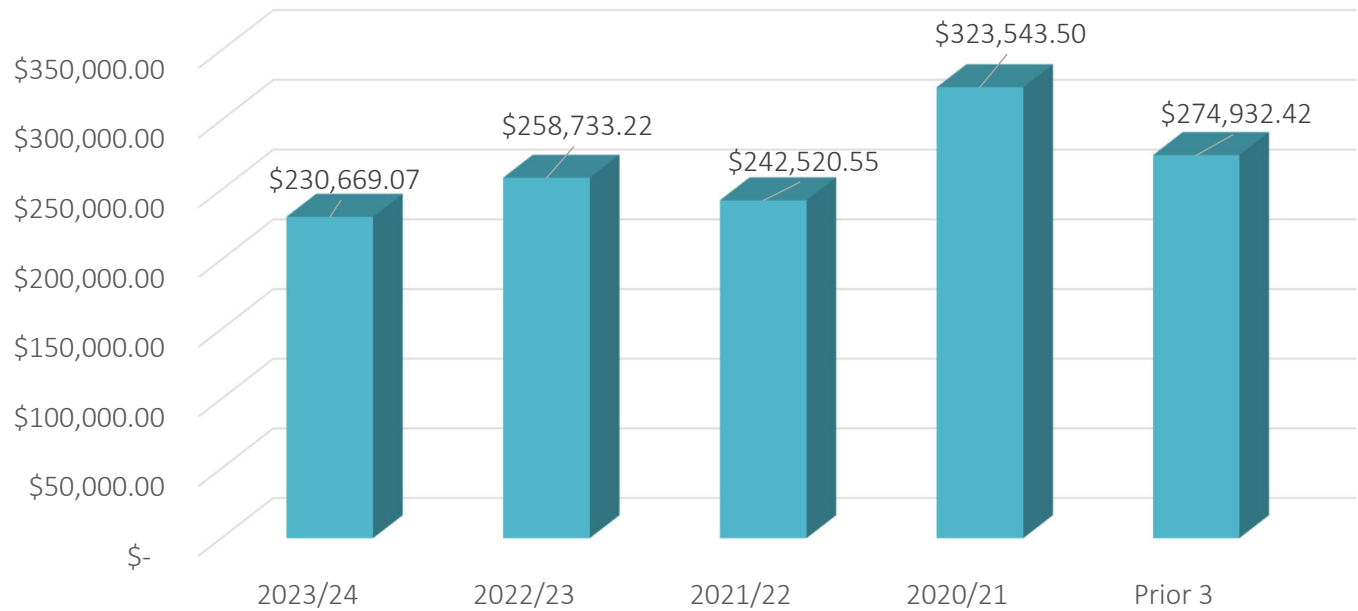
- Years compared – 2020-2024.

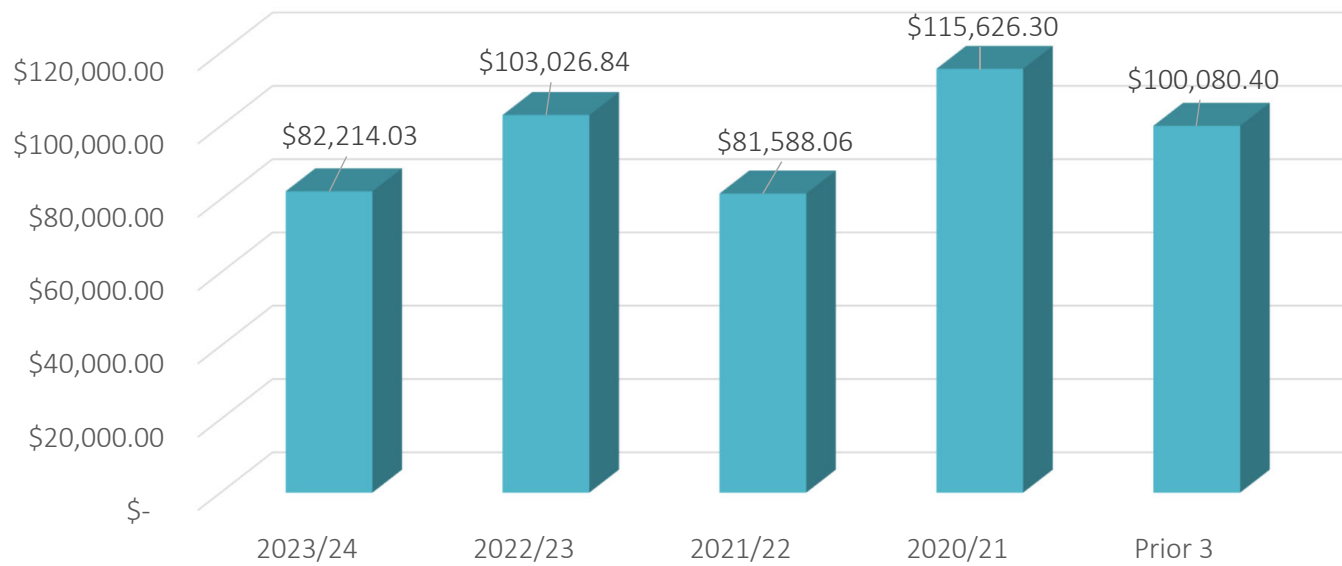
Average Calls per Month per Year
May-April

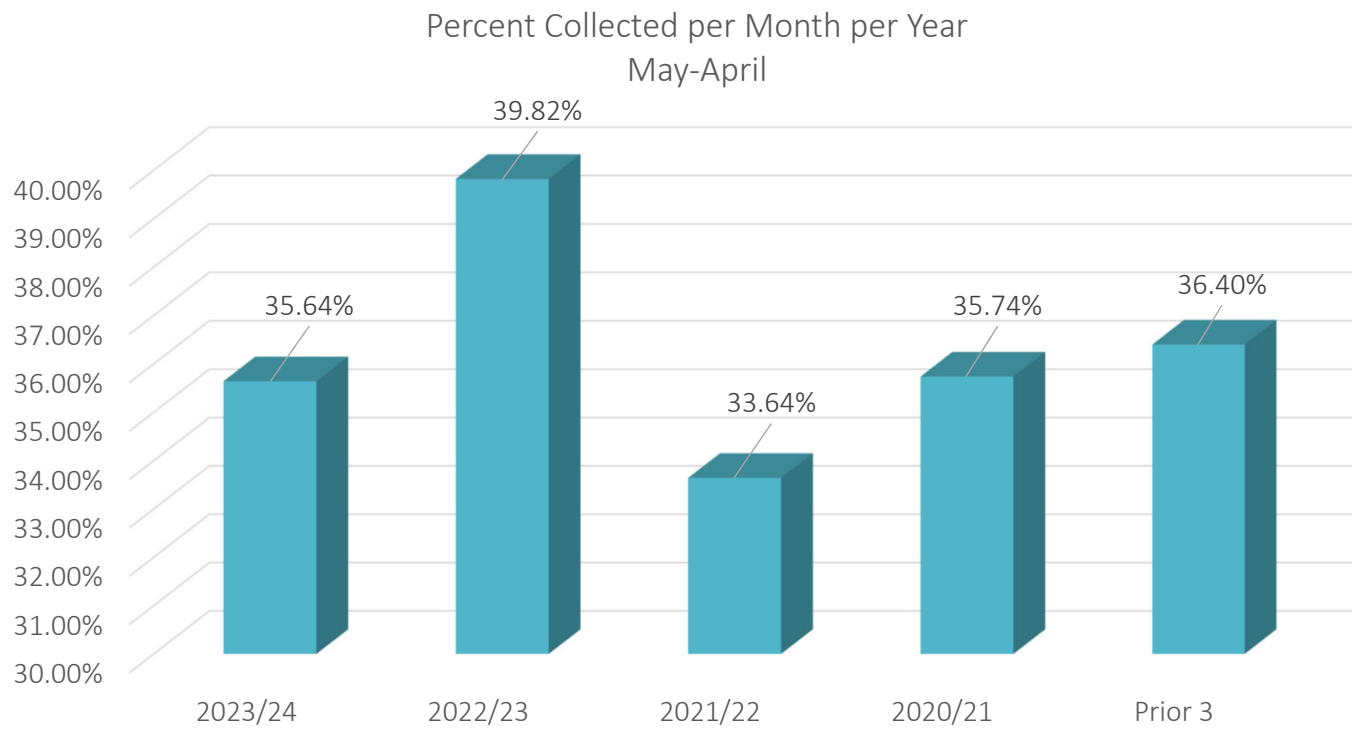


Average Billed per Month per Year
May-April

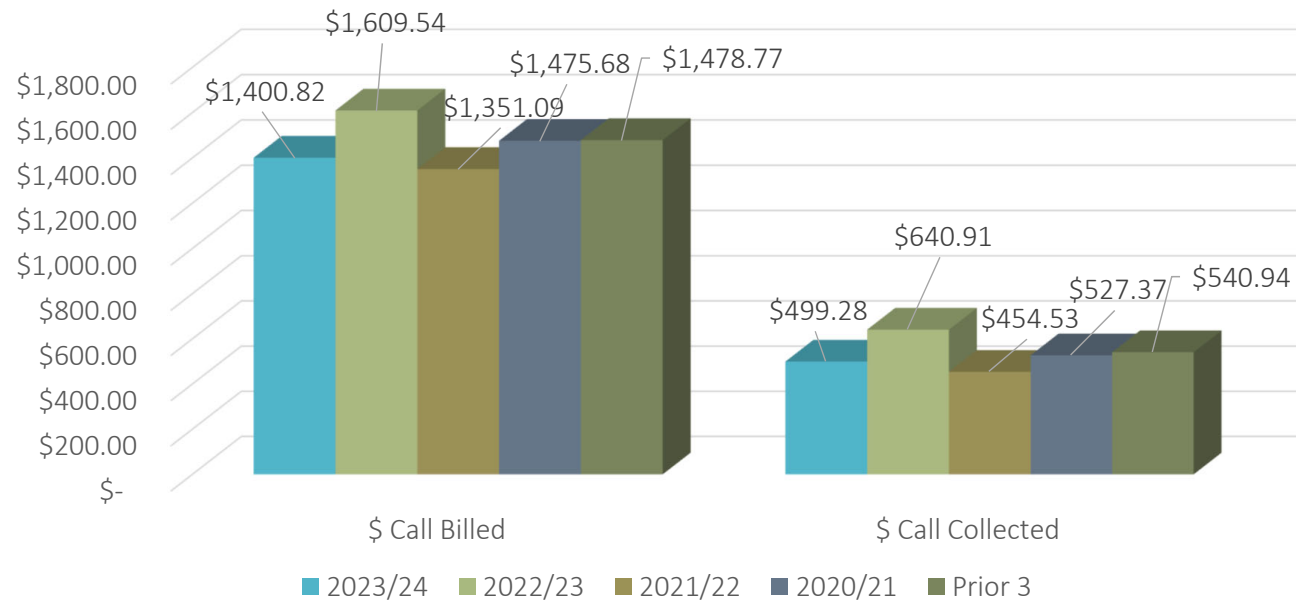


Average Collected per Month per Year

May-April

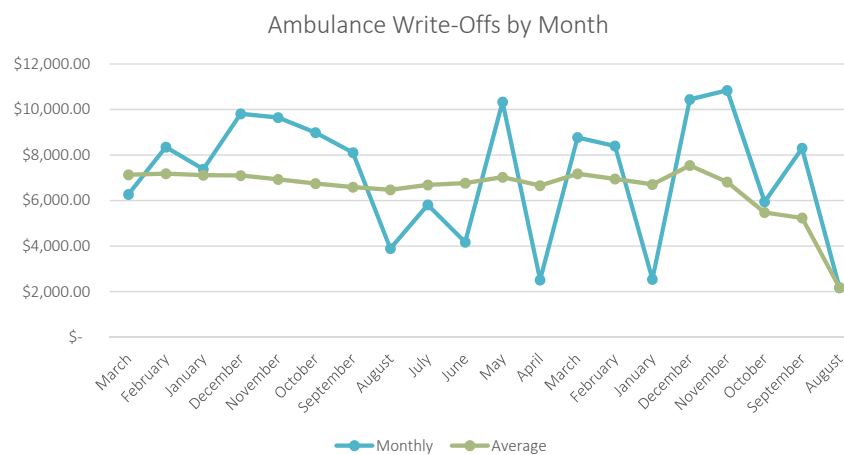

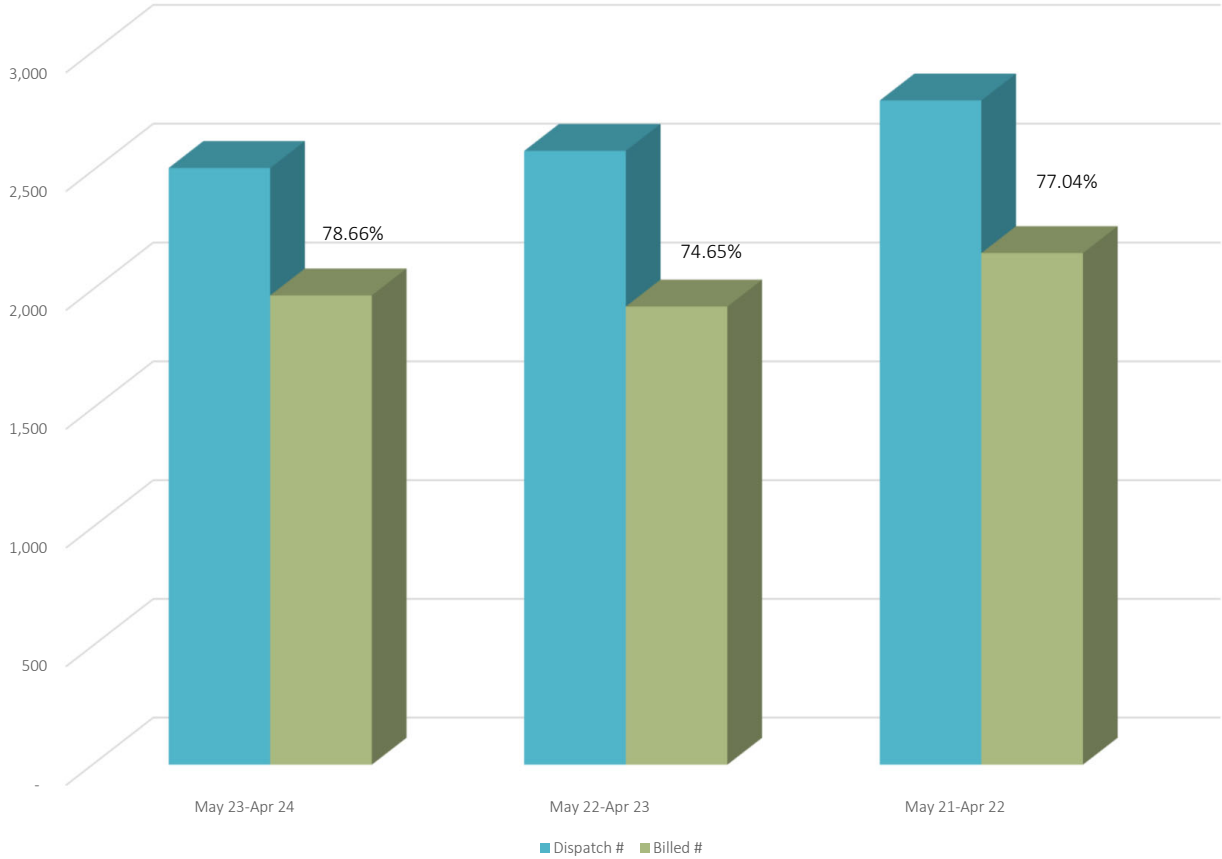
Dispatch Calls Percent Billed Runs - By Month 2021-2024

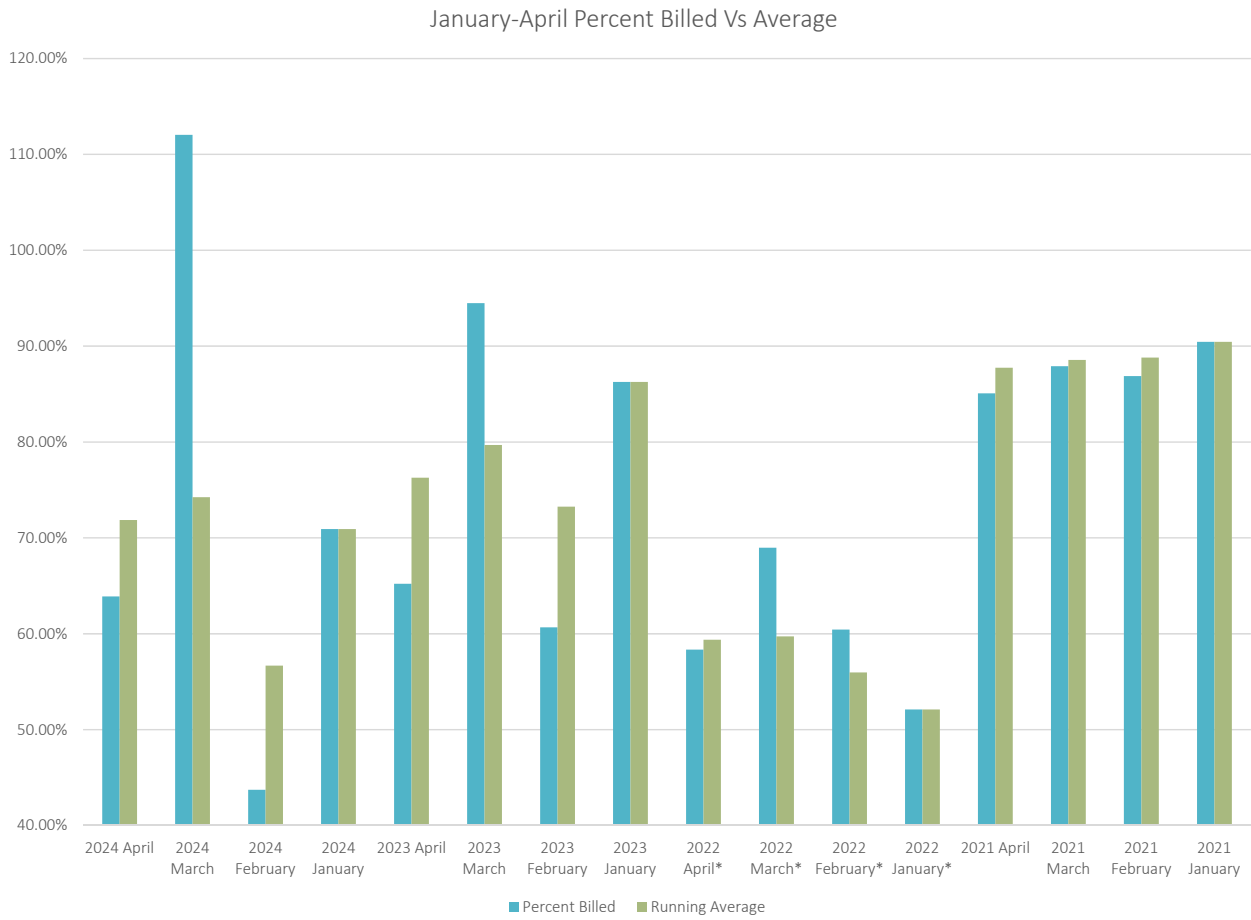


Dispatch Calls Vs Billed Runs - By Year (78.15% Over Four Years)

TOWN OF ROUND LAKE ANNUAL MEETING APRIL 17, 2024

Chairman Hanson called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. In attendance were 17 town residents (including Town board members: - Strandlund, Palmer, Verbeck, Wilson, Chair Hanson; Treasurer Palya, and Clerk McCoy), and 4 nonresident.

Clerk McCoy administered the oath of office to new Town Board Supervisor Marvin Scott Verbeck.

Clerk McCoy presented 2023 Financial Statement. Noting the following: 100K donation from Fire Dept. Auxiliary to be used to equip new fire truck, new debt acquired 375,000, continued depletion of reserve accounts, and continuation of increasing cost overall.

Motion by Pat Feldner/ Mike Feldner to approve 2024 financial report as presented. Motion carried with all 17 electors voting in favor.

Bill Noonan – Need for expansion of fiber optic / internet – Century Link Service problems. Electors discussed similar problems/ alternatives – satellite / Norvado expansion.

Mike Feldner – Thank you to pervious board for support of Fire Dept. and EMS services. Need for EMS ambulance service in Round Lake. Suggested towns (Round Lake, Spider Lake, Hunter) push issue of having a County Ambulance Station in this area. Discussion on this along with the town's willingness to donate land for a building site. Motion by Kathy McCoy / Pat Feldner to approve the donation of up to 5 acres of town owned land to Sawyer County for the exclusive use to provide an ambulance building site to service this area. Motion carried with all 17 electors in favor.

Jim Jabrosky – concerns about safety of new Boat Launch – Tiger Cat Landing. Discussion on possible solutions: Dock / review of design/ and construction.

Pat Feldner – concerns future Fire Dept. Equipment replacement needs – funding town reserve account for this. General discussion and clarification of levy limits, how they originated, and the effect they have had/ and continue to have on local governments. Alternatives, levy increase by the electors, increasing borrowing/ debt / continued work on more grant funding etc. Pat Delany - Town Boards are non-partisan. Problem without raising taxes how can towns continue to provide services. Need to raise taxes – electors can do this.

General discussion on wild fire protection plan and its various elements: Education mailings: Hands on actual property assessments/ coordination other municipalities and agencies.

General discussion on ATV/ UTV issues –Local vs. County jurisdiction: Strandlund – stated that statue provides for control of jurisdiction to road owner – concerns expressed about taking away the town's voice related to this and possible future issues General discussion on opening roads to ATV/ UTV use: economic benefits, connectivity to trail system, law enforcement and safety,

**MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING
BETWEEN
LAC COURTE OREILLES BAND OF LAKE SUPERIOR CHIPPEWA INDIANS
AND
SAWYER COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS
CONCERNING THE SAWYER COUNTY CRIMINAL JUSTICE COORDINATION
COMMITTEE**

This Memorandum of Understanding (“MOU”) is entered into by the Lac Courte Oreilles Tribal Governing Board (“Tribal Governing Board”); the Sawyer County Board of Supervisors (“County Board”).

Recitals:

The Lac Courte Oreilles Tribal Governing Board serves as the governing body of the Lac Courte Oreilles Band of Lake Superior Chippewa Indians (“Tribe”) pursuant to Article III, Section 1 of the Lac Courte Oreilles Constitution and Bylaws, as amended in 1966.

The Sawyer County Board of Supervisors serves as the governing body for Sawyer County and is tasked with coordinating necessary services for the residents of Sawyer County, pursuant to the Wisconsin Constitution Article IV, Section 22 and Section 23; See also Wis. Stat. §§59.03 and §§ 59.10 (2)(3) (5).

Purpose:

The primary purpose of this MOU is to recognize and solidify the relationship between the Tribal Governing Board and the County Board in their efforts to assist with the provision of criminal justice services in Sawyer County. The existing criminal justice services in Sawyer County are; the Circuit Court, Tribal Court, County District Attorney’s Office, Tribal Legal Department, Sawyer County Sheriff’s Department, Tribal Police Department, Department of Corrections as well as Mental Health and Substance Facilitators.

The secondary purpose of this MOU is to establish and support a Criminal Justice Coordinating Committee that shall assist the existing criminal justice services provided in Sawyer County by coordinating the services provided so that strategies can be developed to ensure the efficient and effective deployment of both county and tribal resources.

Roles and Responsibilities:

Tribal Governing Board:

The Tribal Governing Board shall provide two (2) board members, or designate representatives, to serve on the Criminal Justice Coordinating Committee. Those two (2) members will participate with the CJCC and represent tribal interests in developing efficient and effective services for tribal members as well as county residents.

Sawyer County:

The County Board shall provide two (2) board members, or designate representatives, to serve on the Criminal Justice Coordinating Committee. Those two (2) members will participate with the CJCC and represent county interests in developing efficient and effective services for county residents as well as tribal members.

Contributions:

The County agrees to provide a minimum sum of Fifty Thousand dollars (\$50,000.00) annually for the next three (3) budget years with the purpose of establishing and maintaining a Criminal Justice Coordinating Committee. The Tribal Governing Board agrees to provide Fifty Thousand dollars (\$50,000.00) annually for the next three (3) budget years. The funds provided by the tribe and the county shall be coordinated through the Sawyer County Administration and used for purposes of this agreement and subsequent documents created consistent with the agreement. One of those purposes, will be to fund Justice Point to collect data for the purposes of developing programing to address the criminal justice and rehabilitation needs for residents of Sawyer County and tribal members.

Timeframe:

This Memorandum of Understanding shall become effective on February 1, 2024 and shall remain in effect for a period of three years and shall terminate on January 31, 2027.

Establishment of Responsibility:

This MOU is not intended to, and does not create, any right, benefit, or trust responsibility, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law or equity, by any party against Sawyer County or the Lac Courte Oreilles Band of Lake Superior Chippewa Indians, its agencies, its officers, or any other person.
